As a teacher, he understood that lives hung in the balance when being a lifeguard. He gave them an early sense of the importance of professionalism.

Bob received every adult honor or award available in scouting.

This Scouter gave us his all and we shall truly miss him.

On a brighter note, Bob would have been proud of the scouts of Pack and Troop 298 who appeared this month on FOX 5 when they went on the road to College Park. Mary Pat Donals did a superb job conveying the scout message to the Washington area.

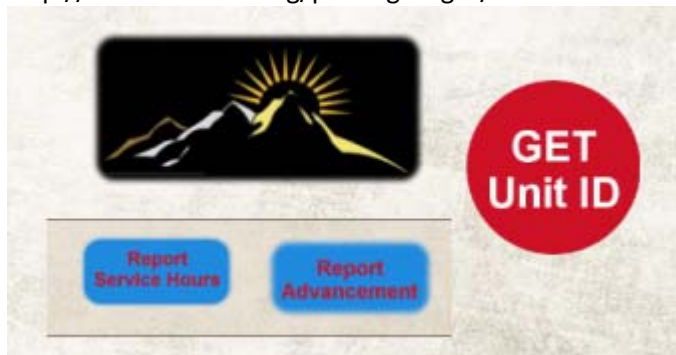

JSN is the start of your new, 2016-2017 school year recruitment.

Now is the time to identify and plan for those activities and parents to support Fall recruitment activities. Make recruitment of that TIGER Den Leader your top priority. Established leadership will attract more TIGERS and parents over the Summer. Validate your Unit's contact information on [www.BeAScout.scouting.org](http://www.BeAScout.scouting.org) so that new families to the area can find you. Don't depend on "Back to School Night" for your recruits. By that time, your target audience has already committed to other activities. Remember you're recruiting parents, convincing them that scouting is a valuable activity for their youth.

**BE VISIBLE.** Ideas you may want to consider as you review the 2016-2017 school year calendar and your school's website.

- Open houses and initial, back-to-school PTA meetings: Usually held the week before school starts and are school specific.
- Fun Fairs and school bazaars.
- Book Fairs: Donate scout bookmarks with your contact information.
- Door hangers. Your school may not support flyers going home and a parent will more likely remember your Unit if they have something in their hand that they can attach to the refrigerator.
- Take pictures. Everyone has a smart phone and everyone takes pictures. Get those pictures posted in the newspaper, your website/Facebook page, charter organization website/Facebook page, the District Facebook page. A caption is all that's required.
- Posting the picture quickly is essential for good results.

## With New Scout Parents Arrange a “Joining Conference”

With the start of the school year, some new faces might be showing up at your troop, crew or pack meeting. This is a good time to remember the importance of the joining conference, particularly for Scouts with special needs.

The joining conference is a scouter’s opportunity to talk with the parents and even the new Scout himself. The conference is a private meeting between one or both of the youth’s parents, the Scout if appropriate and one or two adult leaders who will work with that youth. The tone should be relaxed and informal.

The Boy Scouts of America’s National Disabilities Awareness Committee promotes the joining conference as a way to build a rapport with parents as partners in delivering the Scouting program to youth with special needs. The conference can be a source of useful information for Scout leaders about the strengths and support needed by each youth.

Statistics show that about 15 percent of Scouting-age youth have some form of disability. A joining conference offers the privacy that allows new families to discuss a disability, or accommodations, their Scout might need.

Unit leaders should let the parents decide what to disclose during the conference. Respect what parents share with other adults in the unit. Parents can provide valuable advice on how best to share information on the Scout’s disability with the unit as they have already introduced their child in other settings. The Scouter’s concern is behavior and need for accommodation, so never press for a diagnosis.

## Advancement Notes

### **Current Merit Badge Counselors:**

- Each Unit should have a merit badge coordinator to assist with connecting Scouts to Merit Badge Counselors. The unit merit badge coordinator can gain access to the PGD Merit Badge Counselor data base by contacting Mary Pat Donals, our Merit Badge Dean at [MPDonals@fdic.gov](mailto:MPDonals@fdic.gov).
- New Merit Badge Counselor applications should be given to Mary Pat Donals at Roundtable – or mailed to her at 12129 Beltsville Drive, Beltsville, MD 20705 – or emailed to her at [mpdonals@fdic.gov](mailto:mpdonals@fdic.gov). There is a

process for MBC applications that is separate from new member applications. Each new member application needs to have an Adult Application with the Declarations page (even if you currently are registered with counsel for another position), Merit Badge Counselor Application and current copy of YPT Certificate.

- **Don’t Forget** - Keep your youth protection training current.

## **Internet Advancement**

- Our thanks to those who are using Internet Advancement to update a Scout’s record. 99% of our Packs and Troops are using Internet Advancement.
- Please use your unit’s Internet Advancement Report to buy rank patches at the Scout Store. BSA policy states you can use either a paper copy, or a copy on your cell phone or iPad or Tablets.

## **Boy Scout Advancement**

- Effective 1 January 2016, new rank requirements came into effect. There is a sliding scale recognizing that Scouts who started a rank before this date can continue with the old requirements. - Scouts do not need to buy a new Scout Handbook. A better alternative is to download and print an insert for their current Handbook. ## A ‘How to’ in Maintaining Training Records for Unit Adults

If you are a member of the Unit Key 3, you may update the training records for adults in your unit. (Note: Key 3 is Committee Chair, Chartered Organization Representative, Unit Leader such as Cubmaster or Scoutmaster.)

### Viewing records

1. Log in to your my.scouting.org account.
2. Click the Menu button in the upper left.
3. Select the button corresponding to your unit, select training manager on the menu.
4. Select the “Search Training” icon just above the trained leaders label. The icon looks like a magnifying glass. (If you move the mouse over the icon, it says “Search Training”.)
5. You should see a roster of your unit’s adults. Select the one or more that you want to research.
6. Click the icon with the hand magnifying glass. A full listing of completed courses will appear.
7. If you want to download a printable copy of training records, select the one or more names that you want to research.
8. Click the page looking icon that says “Print member training record”. This will download a .pdf document onto your device.
9. To deselect a name, simply click on the name and the check mark will appear or disappear.
10. To leave, you can log off in the upper right corner. Alternatively, you can select the menu and continue with other tasks.

### Updating records

1. Log in to your my.scouting.org account.
2. Click the Menu button in the upper left.
3. Select the button corresponding to your unit, select training manager on the menu.
4. Select the icon just above the trained leaders label. (The icon looks like a certificate with a seal on it.) If you move the mouse over the icon, it says “Add Training”.
5. Select the program. Your choice of program will define the course choices in the course section.
6. Select the course. Look for the course code in parentheses. YPT can be found here.
7. Select the date completed.
8. Move the mouse over the add member icon on the left side of the screen. The screen will fly out.
9. The search block is in the upper left. Enter the BSA ID# or the Scouter’s name (last name first).
10. Names that match your search will appear. Select the correct name (just click on the name).
11. When all the data is correct – program, class, date, and name, click the submit button in the lower right.
12. One last confirmation block will appear. Click add and you are done.
13. To leave, you can log off in the upper right corner. Alternatively, you can select the menu and continue with other tasks.

### Adding unit personnel to specific jobs

1. Log in to your my.scouting.org account.
2. Click the Menu button in the upper left.
3. Select the button corresponding to your unit, select organization security manager on the menu.
4. You should see the Key 3 members listed and a list of functional positions.
5. You can’t change the Key 3 members, but you can change the functional positions.
6. Click on the position, new window appears.
7. Click the pull down for name and select the correct name from the list of adults in the unit.
8. Select the start date and end date of the assignment. Normally these will equal your charter effective and expiration date. You can set an expiration date earlier than the charter expiration if you need to update the dates of authorization.
9. To leave, you can log off in the upper right corner. Alternatively, you can select the menu and continue with other tasks.
