

Parents of my Scouts are on an uncertain journey. They'll only know if they did the right things and made good decisions in retrospect. Right now they will have to trust something.

Scouting is a great thing to trust; it has connected the dots for a lot of boys in the uncertain years of their march towards adulthood. Trusting Scouting is not trusting an individual, a troop or a program but a process driven by some simple principles.

Camping and hiking and the other things Scouts do are not just recreation. Badges, metals and sashes are not just a system of recognition. Taking responsibility is not just a course in leadership. All of these things are only parts of a grand process that gives Scouts a way to connect the dots into the future.

If I ask an old Scout what he thinks he got out of Scouting he usually stops and thinks for a while before he answers. He's trying to figure out how to quantify climbing his first mountain, striking out on his own for the first week he spent away from home, the comradeship of Scouts who have become his lifelong friends, finding courage and confidence against a hundred challenges. Most can't say exactly how all this connected the dots for them; they only know that it did.

It's easy to trust things that always go well, that are easy to understand and easy to do. But sometimes you have to go with your gut, your intuition that you've chosen well. Scouting is not all sunshine and roses; there are real challenges that lead to real achievements.

You have to trust in something.

Arrow of Light Recognition Ceremony - **Corrected Date**



The 10th Annual Arrow of Light Recognition Ceremony will be conducted by the Order of the Arrow on Thursday March 1, 2012 at 7:00 PM, location at Smarts Middle School, 850 N King St. Leesburg. **This Ceremony is open to all Webelos 2 boys earning their Arrow of Light rank from fall of 2011 through the 2012 school year**, whether they have earned it early and have bridged to a troop prior to the Ceremony, or they anticipate earning it after the Ceremony. Boys who receive this notification after they have already bridged, may register through their pack or on their own.

This very impressive Ceremony is presented by the Goose Creek OA ceremony team, wearing handcrafted native Powhatan Indian regalia. We usually have a noisy crowd, until the first drum beat sounds to start the ceremony. Then you can hear a pin drop. Packs and boys can have their pictures taken with the ceremonialists after the ceremony. BE SURE TO BRING YOUR CAMERA!

This event does NOT replace your own pack Arrow of Light ceremony, nor will the Webelos receive their actual Arrow of Light patch at the ceremony. The Ceremony honors their achievement in a unique way by the older Scouts who are waiting to welcome them into their troops and all of the fun and adventure they will have along the Trail to Eagle Scout! The Webelos will receive a special OA-Arrow of Light Ceremony badge, designed by the OA chapter for this event, as well as a custom certificate of recognition of the highest rank in Cub Scouting.

While there is **NO COST** for this event, **pre-registration is REQUIRED**. **Registration must be received no later than Sunday, February 26th, 2012.** Be sure that you include the number of guests and leaders that will be coming to the event. Forms are available on the district Website.


OA Elections

District Championship Pinewood Derby



Gentlemen, start your engines!

Goose Creek District Pinewood Derby will be holding a district championship Pinewood Derby race (hosted by Venture Crew 7070) where only the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in individual pack events are eligible to participate. Trophies will be awarded to the top three fastest cars in each rank, Tiger, Wolf, Bear and Webelos. Overall trophies will also be awarded to the top three cars for all ranks.

Important: All cars must meet the District's Derby construction rules (available on the district website in the 'Cubs' section). Just because a car passed the pack's inspection does not mean it will pass the district inspection. *Take special note of the wheels and axle rules!*

Pre-registration is encouraged to ensure that all entrants will receive the 2012 Goose Creek District Pinewood Derby patch. Pre-registration may be done individually or by Pack.

The derby will be held Sat, **March 17, 2012** at Tolbert Elementary School (691 Potomac Station Dr NE, Leesburg 20176). Registration will start at 8 AM and racing will start at 9 AM.

Spring Camporee



The Spring Camporee will take place but we have changed the date for it to April 13-15 in order to keep the two week separation between it and the OA Ordeal which had to be rescheduled to April 27-29.

The theme for the Camporee will be 'Scout Olympics' with patrols and individual Scouts competing for the Gold, Silver, or Bronze prizes in various competitions. Some of the competitions will be based on testing for basic Scout skills such as fire building, knot tying, and first aid while others will test more advanced skills such as ax throwing, orienteering, wood splitting and who knows what! We may even have some events for Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters.

The morning and early afternoon time slots will be set aside as the 'Qualifying Period' where patrols and individuals can select the events they want to compete in and see if they are good enough to qualify. The late afternoon time slot will be the Finals where the top qualifiers in each event will compete for the prize.

Each troop participating in the Camporee will be tasked to run one of the competitions. This includes planning the event, purchasing the material (with reimbursement), and running it during one of the time slots. Very small troops (8 Scouts or less) will not be required to run a competition event but will be asked to support the Camporee through some other chore. We do have a list of events we would like to see but will work with units to develop their own.

Cubmobile Derby



What do you have when you make a Pinewood Derby car big enough for a Scout to sit in? A Cubmobile! The district is planning to hold our second annual Cubmobile Derby on May 5, 2012. We have a nice gentle, paved slope all lined up for the race and now we need dens to build cubmobiles to race.

Dens will race as teams with a minimum of three and a maximum of five Scouts per team. Dens with six or more Scouts participating will need to register as two, or more, teams. Every Scout on a team will be given a chance to race their cubmobile down the course.

Teams from the same pack will be allowed to use the same cubmobile if they want to. Cubmobiles built for last year's derby may be used again this year.

Derby fee is \$6 per Scout and all teams must pre-register with an \$18 deposit (i.e, the fee for three Scouts). A full information/registration packet and instructions on how to build a cubmobile will be ready by the February roundtable and available on the district website.



- Selected ideas will receive a \$2,500 minimum advance on 20 years percentage of sales. Plus, Edison Nation will split the royalties 50-50 with inventors on the products they select.
- Selected inventors will be named the "inventor" on any issued patents and will have an opportunity to appear on the award-winning Everyday Edisons television series on PBS.
- It's \$25 to submit an idea (or \$10 for current BSA members).
- Ideas should be "well-communicated" and include sketches, images, or other media to support them.





Wilderness & Remote First Aid



Classes:

- Feb 11-12, 8 AM 6 PM, Camp Snyder

Now required by the Boy Scouts of America for its high-adventure bases, Philmont and Northern Tier, this 16 hour intensive course teaches students how to properly assess, treat, and manage common illnesses and injuries in a remote environment where definitive care of a physician and/or rapid transport is not readily available.

Time is the essential element distinguishing wilderness first aid from standard first aid. When calling 9-1-1 is not an immediate option, or when help could be an hour or even days away, the task of managing the injured and the ill will challenge you beyond basic first-aid knowledge, and require the skills you will learn in this course.

Long hikes, extended lengths of rivers, large expanses of ocean, and miles of asphalt may separate the patient from a medical facility. You may have to endure heat or cold, rain, wind, or darkness. The equipment needed for treatment and evacuation may have to be improvised from what is available, and communication with the "outside world" may be limited or nonexistent. Remote locations and harsh environments may require creative treatments.

PREREQUISITES:

- Participants must be at least 14 years of age.
- Participants must hold current certification in Adult CPR/AED

An American Red Cross Adult CPR/AED is being offered on Friday evening prior to the course.

Backcountry Outdoor Leader Skills



This course is aimed at all adults working with older youth regardless of program (Venture Patrol, Varsity Scout, Venturing Crew, or Explorer Post). The target audience is leaders planning High Adventure treks at backcountry venues not supported by BSA infrastructure; however, units planning to attend High Adventure bases supported by BSA will find this course useful, inasmuch as unit shakedowns will, most likely, take place in venues not supported by BSA infrastructure.

Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills is offered by the Council Training Committee as an optional follow-on to the basic course, Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills.

The course is in two parts: one 6-hour classroom session followed by a two-day weekend outdoor session.

Part 1 — Sat. 3/17/2012 from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM (Aldersgate UMC, 1301 Collingwood Rd, Alexandria, VA) — Addresses ways to effectively work with older youth. Covers the detailed preparation and planning that must be done before you go out including risk management. Summarizes the personal and crew equipment used for lightweight camping. Plans the weekend overnight session.

Part 2 — Sat. 3/31/2012, 7:30 AM thru Sun. 4/1, 12:30 PM (Camp Highroads, Middleburg, VA) — Participants will practice core leader skills for the outdoor program — Leave No Trace, navigation (map & compass plus GPS), terrain awareness, expedition menu planning and food preparation, stove and stove maintenance, wilderness first aid issues, expedition health and hygiene, team building.

Scouters planning to accompany a crew to any of the BSA-sponsored High Adventure Camps should also attend the High Adventure Training provided by the Council's High Adventure Committee.

Cost: \$40, class size limited to 32.

Wood Badge



Wood Badge is designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of all Scouters, in all leadership positions for the BSA. The Wood Badge course incorporates the traditions of over 80 years of Wood Badge, while adding the management and leadership training necessary to become a successful leader in the 21st Century.

Wood Badge is more than a classroom; it's entertaining, fun games, hands-on projects, team building, and inspirational events. You will come away with an appreciation of Scouting's heritage, as well as a vision of the role you will play in its future, and the impact you will make on the youth in your own unit, the district and our council. Participation in this course will provide skills to help you achieve success in other aspects of your life or in your career! The course starts with two weekend, fun-filled practical training periods where the Scouter lives as a member of a team progressing through Scouting, and learning the skills of leadership. The outdoor experience is followed by a period of up to eighteen months during which the Scouter applies the skills learned during the practical experience in his or her Scouting position – at the unit, district, or council level. Through this period, each Scouter is assigned a counselor who acts as a resource, evaluator, and Scouting mentor to assist the participant in putting into action those points discussed during the course. This is demonstrated by the process known as working your ticket.

Prerequisite Training for Wood Badge:

Complete the basic training courses for your primary Scouting position. Cub Leaders must have completed New Leader Essentials and the position specific training for their position. Boy Scout and Varsity leaders must have completed New Leader Essentials, their position specific training as well as Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Venture advisors must complete New Leader Essentials, their position specific training and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Other unit, district, and council leaders must complete New Leader Essentials, plus their position specific training (e.g. Committee, Commissioners, District Chairs, or Council Chairs)


