And once we get a couple years under our belts, we might be asked (or volunteer) to help at the district level. Would you help train other leaders? Would you help the camping committee with day camp? In much the same way as we watch our boys grow and develop their skills, then go on to help the younger ones as they get older, so do we start giving back to Scouting by helping others. We had fun on the way up; everyone should have that opportunity!

I suspect that if you're reading this article, you've gone beyond that second and third hour to the point where it's almost like another full-time job. We go to work and do the job we get paid to do, but in our time away from work we find ourselves doing more and more for our pack, troop, district or council. Clarke Green summed it up very well in a piece called Extraordinary People in his podcast number nineteen (<a href="https://www.scoutmastercg.com/2010/05/scoutmaster-podcast-19">www.scoutmastercg.com/2010/05/scoutmaster-podcast-19</a>/) a couple years ago. We become those extraordinary people because we do things that are beyond the ordinary.

Scouting is different. Scouting is not something you clear your schedule for an evening and go do for an hour a week, then return to your home and your life and resume whatever you were doing before. Maybe this is true of your bowling league, or poker group, or softball team, but Scouting is different. Unlike most other activities, Scouting is more about "be" than "do." When we become involved in Scouting, not only do we the instill the values of the Scout Oath and Scout Law in our youth, but those values rub off on us as well.

#### Silver Beaver Nominations



This national award is the highest form of recognition that a local council can bestow on an adult volunteer. Established in 1931, the Silver Beaver Award is presented for distinguished service to people within a BSA local council. A recipient must be a registered adult volunteer member of the BSA and show significant service and leadership in three areas: Boy Scouts, youth programs other than Boy Scouts, and the community.

It is extremely important that the nomination form includes information about <u>all three</u> of the service and leadership areas. The Council review committee can base their decision only on the submitted documentation and missing or ambiguous information often means that a deserving person does not get the award.

In order to ensure that all Goose Creek nominations have the best information before they are sent in to Council the District has set up a Goose Creek Silver Beaver Review committee. The purpose of this committee is not to decide which nominations to send in, but to review the nominations and to identify where additional information or clarification should be included. All members of the committee are Silver Beaver recipients including some who have served on the Council review committee.

**For nomination forms and submittal information**: On the District web page select Resources and Help from the menu and go to the listing for the 2012 Silver Beaver nominations (or just click on the big silver colored beaver in the upper left hand corner of the splash page). All nominations must be in to the committee by Nov 15.


About the Grant: A generous contribution from the Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation has made it possible for local councils to present **selected** Eagle Scout candidates with a \$100 prepaid gift card to be used toward their service projects. Life Scouts who are planning a construction-based project may apply. Local councils will be notified of their allotment of awards, which will be figured based on a percentage of each council's three-year average for Eagle Scout Awards earned. The council or district Eagle project review board will determine which projects qualify for a Lowe's grant. The local council will distribute its allotment of the \$100 prepaid gift cards to recipients. Cards must be used to purchase building materials and equipment for the Eagle candidate's service project. The gift card may be used at any Lowe's location or any place that it is accepted.

## "Approval" for a Scout to Work on a Merit Badge



Andy,

I'm a District Advancement Chair, and we have a local problem: a troop and Scoutmaster delaying the "approval" for a Scout to work on a merit badge.

In your June 22, 2012 column you said, "...the BSA's national advancement team has stated clearly and without equivocation that a Scoutmaster cannot 'decide' to withhold his signature from any registered Scout seeking to begin any merit badge, at any time. The 'approval' means only that the Scout is indeed a registered youth member of the BSA; it means nothing more. No Scoutmaster is permitted to apply 'judgment' regarding any Scout's age, abilities, rank, or interest. He is to sign the merit badge application and provide the Scout with name and contact information of a registered Merit Badge Counselor. End of story."

I'm being challenged on that, and after reading through the current advancement guidelines yet again, all I can find is this: "Though a few merit badges may have certain restrictions; short of them, any registered Scout may work on any of them at any time, as long as he has the approval of his unit leader." This is in the new GUIDE TO ADVANCEMENT (section 7.0.0.2) and it's being used to delay approval, based on an interpretation to the effect that if it weren't discretionary, the "as long as he has the approval" part wouldn't be necessary.

Thank you for posing your question to Andy, who has reached out to us. This particular issue has received a lot of attention since the GUIDE TO ADVANCEMENT (GTA) was published, even though the "approval" part of the language was taken from the SCOUTMASTER HANDBOOK. We've been monitoring some of the discussion groups, however, and the BSA National Advancement Committee has reached a resolution on how this will be treated. The Committee has decided to change the language that will appear with the Unit Leader signature on the next reprint of the Application for Merit Badge (aka "blue card"). It will no longer be "...is qualified to begin working for the merit badge noted on the reverse side" and will become "I have discussed this merit badge with this Scout and recommended at least one merit badge counselor." (Note that this wording may change slightly as it goes through the national BSA editing process; but its purpose and intent will not.)

The next step will be revised language in the GTA, which will define the unit leader's role as that of an adviser; not an approval authority. If a unit leader, for whatever reason, believes a Scout isn't "ready" for a merit badge, the unit leader can try to lead the Scout to something else; however, it is the intention of the Boy Scouts of America that the decision to proceed with a merit badge belongs to the Scout. ## **Service Project Guidelines**



In May 2012, the National Health & Safety Committee issued two new documents that are designed to assist youth and adult leaders in planning and safely performing service projects. The Service Project Guidelines (No. 680-027) is for youth, adults and members of OA to use in planning service projects and minimizing the opportunities for accidents.

The *Age Guidelines for Tool Use and Work at Elevations or Excavations* (No. 680-028) is designed to provide youth and leaders guidance on age appropriate use of tools or work that may be performed 4-ft. above or below the ground. The Service Project Planning Guideline is useful in the planning process for any service project, whether it is done in a public area or on a council/regional or national BSA facility. This guide used many of the parts of the current Eagle Scout Leadership Service Project book. The steps listed in this guide will help youth and adult leaders to recognize and plan for contingencies as well as the ser-vice project needs. Although the Guide is 5 pages long, plenty of "write-in space" is provided. This document can be completed and then shared with the leader-ship of the service project as a good communication tool. Likewise, it is always a good practice to utilize this form for all pack, troop, crew or team service projects. Councils can also use this form as guidance to leaders for such service projects as "Scouting for Food" or use by Order of the Arrow members in their service projects on or off council properties. ## **Eagle Recognition Letters**



If you want your new Eagle Scouts to receive recognition letters from one of the military services, follow these directions:

**Army** – for the U.S. Army Youth Certificate of Recognition, signed by the Army's Chief of Staff, nominations must be sent to a local U.S. Army recruiting battalion or applied for online at **www.GoArmy.com/ycr/**.

**Navy** – for a U.S. Navy Eagle Scout Recognition Certificate, send requests to the commanding officer of the local navy Recruiting District. District locations are available at *www.NavyCS.com/districts.html* or by calling the nearest navy recruiter. Requests should include the new Eagle Scout's name (as it will appear on the certificate), date of the award ceremony, mailing address to send the certificate, and information for contacting the troop leader.

**Air Force** – Requests for an Eagle Scout congratulatory letter from the U.S. Air Force should be sent of AFRS/PA, Attn: Scout Letters, 550 D Street West, Suite 1, Randolph AFB, TX 78150-4527.

**Marines** – Send your request, in writing, to Commandant of the Marine Corps, Director of Marine Corps Staff, The Pentagon, Rm. 4E791, Washington, D.C. 20350-3000.

## Making Use of BeAScout.org



If you're making full use of BeAScout.org, you know what a great marketing tool it can be. Think of it as the new front door or welcome mat for your units.

If you're not, here's how it works: A visitor looking for info about Scouting enters a ZIP code and – bam! – the prospective Scout or Scout parent is transported to your site. What does your visitor see? You'll surely list the basic contact info – meeting times, location, phone, and e-mail links. But you've got to show them something that will make the newcomer say, "I gotta join."

"There are so many advantages to customizing here," says Michael Ramsey, director of marketing communications and brand management. "You could change your message every day, if you wanted to." That means offering added features such as links to your Web site, cool photos, details about upcoming events, and more. If your troop is noted for great backpacking trips, say so. If it has won a recent award, post a shout-out. "This is your chance to hang out your shingle in the marketplace," Ramsey says. "The sky's the limit."

To customize your unit's BeAScout.org listing the unit leader (Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Crew Adviser) must log in to their myscouting.org account. This is the same account used for youth protection training and online rechartering. On the left side of the screen there is a BeAScout link. Follow that link to customize your unit's BeAScout listing. This link is only available to unit leaders.

## One Oath and Law Proposed for All BSA Programs



The volunteer-led task forces supporting the 2011–2015 National Council Strategic Plan's Goal 411, after considerable deliberation, have recommended moving to the use of the Scout Oath and Law for all BSA programs. This change would primarily impact Cub Scouts and Venturing.

The recommendation has been reviewed and endorsed by the national support committee responsible for program content changes. It has also been discussed and endorsed by the national officers of the BSA, and Wayne Perry has directed that the recommendation be brought forward to the National Executive Board at its October 2012 meeting.

The basis for the recommendation is strategic in nature and is intended to reinforce the connection between all of our BSA programs and the mission of the Boy Scouts of America. Since it is the mission of the BSA "to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law," it is the task forces' judgment that this goal is best achieved if all programs use the Scout Oath and Law as their primary statement of values and ideals.

As the changes might impact Cub Scouts, consultation with cognitive and child development specialists and educational practitioners involved in Scouting supported the reasonability of the recommendation and did not identify any age-appropriate difficulties with implementation. Additionally, research among parents and Cub Scout leaders was also supportive.

The changes as they impact Cub Scouts would be implemented with the full rollout of the work of the 411 Task Force, scheduled for the 2015–2016 program year.

#### **Unit and District Tools Phase I**



Replacing MyScouting.org with Unit and District Tools is the first step in moving toward a more user-friendly, self service oriented BSA. This new website will be the first piece in the new Membership database that is currently being built. Similar to MyScouting.org, Unit Tools will eventually give unit leaders, volunteers, parents, Scouts, etc., the opportunity to create a profile, take/track training, perform rechartering, maintain advancement, plan activities, and more. In addition to the previously mentioned items, the new Unit and District Tools application will also give the unit Key 3 the ability to log in, set up the administration function (to grant administration access to three additional registered leaders), access their rosters, assign people into dens and patrols, and perform attendance tracking.

Unit Tools will be released in multiple phases. Phase I (set for release this summer) will include the basic items, while Phase II (set for release later this fall) will include more detailed, position-oriented items. The release of the other phases will be relayed at a later time.

## **Tour Permit and Activity Plan is Online**



The new digital Tour Permit and Activity Plan is now online. NCAC will be accepting paper tour plans until September 1, 2012, to ease the transition, but please encourage your leaders to use the online form for new events. To use the online form you will need to log in to <a href="https://www.MyScouting.org">www.MyScouting.org</a> and select the tour and activity plan under your "Unit Tool".

All Leaders listed will receive a proof of insurance. Currently there is not a way to identify a "tour leader," so please verify all email addresses to ensure you receive your proof of insurance. If you have any questions, please contact your District Executive.

## **BSA Policy Statement on Political Activities**



Boy Scouts of America policy prohibits Scouts from participating in political activities. BSA membership applications, under Program Policies, state: Citizenship activities are encouraged, but partisan political activities are prohibited.

Uniformed unit members and leaders may participate in flag ceremonies at political events and may lead the Pledge of Allegiance; however, they should retire after the ceremony and not remain on the speakers' platform or in a conspicuous location where television viewers could construe their presence as an endorsement or symbol of support. In addition, photos of candidates or Scouts in uniform or BSA marks and logos are not allowed in political campaign materials of any kind. Leaders must be alert to situations that would imply that the BSA favors one candidate over another. Strict observance of our long-standing policy against the active participation of uniformed Scouts and leaders in political events is mandatory.

## **NOVA Awards Program**



The Boy Scouts of America's NOVA Awards program incorporates learning with cool activities and exposure to science, technology, engineering and mathematics for Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Venturers. The hope is that the requirements and activities for earning these awards stimulates interest in STEM-related fields and shows how science, technology, engineering and mathematics apply to everyday living and the world around them. Counselors and mentors help bring this engaging, contemporary, and fun program to life for youth members.

There are four Nova awards for Cub Scouts, Webelos Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Venturers. Each award covers one component of STEM—science, technology, engineering, or mathematics. For their first Nova award, Scouts earn the distinctive Nova award patch. After that, a Scout can earn three more Nova awards, each one recognized with a separate pi  $(\pi)$  pin-on device that attaches to the patch. The patch and the three devices represent each of the four STEM topics—science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.


The Supernova awards have more rigorous requirements than the Nova awards. The requirements and activities were designed to motivate youth and recognize more in-depth, advanced achievement in STEM-related activities.

All requirements may be found in the Nova awards guidebooks, available through local Scout shops—one for Cub Scouts, one for Boy Scouts, and one for Venturers. The requirements can be completed with a parent or an adult leader as the counselor (for the Nova awards) or mentor (for the Supernova awards). Each guidebook includes a section for the counselor and mentor.

# **Training Opportunities**

## **Revised Safe Swim Defense Training**



There is newly revised Safe Swim Defense training found under the My Scouting tab at *www.Scouting.org*. If you last reviewed that training prior to June of 2012, you should check out the latest version with video footage, which re-places cartoons with video footage. The guidelines have not changed, but the revised training provides additional detail and clarity. A DVD of the updated training is also available from *www.ScoutStuff.org*.

BSA policies require unit swimming activities to be supervised by adults with current Safe Swim Defense training. However, the training also provides important information for family swimming events and may be taken by anyone. Although drowning occurs year-round, summer is the prime season, with many groups headed to the water for the Labor Day holiday. Keep your unit, family, and friends safe by following the safety guidelines in Scouting's Safe Swim Defense.

## **Adult Training Requirements for 2012**



The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America has set the training requirements for all units to re-charter in 2012. For 2012 all Direct Contact Leaders must be trained in their positions. This means that if a leader has direct contact with a youth (i.e. outings, meetings, etc.) then they will have to be trained for their position. This includes all Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Crew Associate Advisors and their assistants, all Den Leaders (Tiger Cub, Wolf, Bear, and Webelos) and their assistants, and any other registered leaders that have contact with youth.

#### Notes:

- New leaders are required to complete Youth Protection training within 30 days of registering. It must be renewed every 2 years
- This Is Scouting is no longer required, it is now supplemental training.
- Fast Start training is no longer required.


