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The Aims of Scouting

'Aim' is a particularly well chosen word to describe our focus as adult volunteers in Scouting.

Scouting has three specific objectives, commonly referred to as the "Aims of Scouting." They are character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness.

One definition of 'aim' is "A purpose or intention toward which one's efforts are directed". As a shooting sports director for our camp years ago I learned a great deal about aiming. It's not as simple as leveling a bow or rifle at the target and hoping for the best. Aiming and shooting is a complex set of actions; the goal of a good shooter is developing consistency in their aim and execution of the shot.

When an arrow leaves the bow and travels towards the target it is subject to a number of forces that effect it's flight and where it hits the target. New archers are interested in shooting as many arrows towards the target as they can. As they progress they begin to understand the nine steps of a successful shot. They refine and practice their shot until it is as consistent as possible and watch their scores improve.

As new adult volunteers we are first interested in doing. We jump in and start where we are. As we gain experience and knowledge we begin to refine our work, to perfect our aim. Our goal is consistently hitting the target and we soon learn that the most important part of that is focus on the aim.

While archery director one Scout experienced in instinctive shooting used his own traditional longbow with incredible accuracy. I asked him about his aiming technique and he said that he concentrated on the cross printed on the center of the paper target. This cross was formed by two thin lines about 1/2 inch long that I doubt he could see from 20 yards but he knew it was there.

Our work in Scouting does not aim at a literal printed paper target, but we can picture the aim of Scouting just as this archer focused on the cross he could not actually see.

An arrow's flight depends wholly on how well it is aimed and released. A Scout's progress is largely dependent on how well we know and focus on the aim. Once they are aimed we let them go, we let them fly on their own and there are many influences that affect where they hit the target – the flight is out of our hands.

Our job is not the flight, but the aim.



Approved by the Cubmaster and pack committee for recommendation to the den leader. Registered as a youth member of a troop, team, or crew.

Responsibilities: The Cub Scout den chief's responsibilities are to:

- Help Cub Scouts achieve the purposes of Cub Scouting.
- Serve as the activities assistant at den meetings.
- Set a good example through attitude and uniforming.
- Be a friend to the boys in the den.
- Help lead weekly den meetings.
- Help the den in its part of the monthly pack meeting.
- Know the importance of the monthly theme and pack meeting plans.
- Meet regularly with the den leader to review den and pack meeting plans. Meet as needed with adult members of the den, pack, and troop.
- Receive training from the den leader (and Cubmaster or assistant Cubmaster) and attend Den Chief Training.
- Encourage Cub Scouts to become Webelos Scouts when they are eligible.

Webelos-o-ree 2012



On Sept 22-23 the District held our 8th annual Webelos-o-ree and it was our biggest yet! We had about 240 Webelos, 200 parents, and 8 Boy Scout troops attending and everyone had a fantastic time. Taught by the Boy Scouts the Webelos were able to tie knots and cross a monkey bridge; shoot BBs, arrows, and slingshots; earn their Readyman badge; learn about emergency preparedness knife safety, and cooking; and build fires.

The evening was filled with making and cooking meals in foil, baking bread on a stick, and a rousing campfire that started with a Four Winds ceremony done by the Boy Scout Order of the Arrow and filled with skits and songs.

Though the staff watched anxiously for the thunderstorms the radios where predicting for the late afternoon they never showed up. Some severe winds did show up that night, however, and knocked over some canopies and flattened some tents.

Unfortunately our patch manufacturer missed their deadline date and the patches for the event were still in the mail. We will have them ready for pickup at the October Roundtable.

. Silver Beaver Nominations



This national award is the highest form of recognition that a local council can bestow on an adult volunteer. Established in 1931, the Silver Beaver Award is presented for distinguished service to people within a BSA local council. A recipient must be a registered adult volunteer member of the BSA and show significant service and leadership in three areas: Boy Scouts, youth programs other than Boy Scouts, and the community.

It is extremely important that the nomination form includes information about <u>all</u> <u>three</u> of the service and leadership areas. The Council review committee can base their decision only on the submitted documentation and missing or ambiguous information often means that a deserving person does not get the award.

In order to ensure that all Goose Creek nominations have the best information before they are sent in to Council the District has set up a Goose Creek Silver Beaver Review committee. The purpose of this committee is not to decide which nominations to send in, but to review the nominations and to identify where additional information or clarification should be included. All members of the committee are Silver Beaver recipients including some who have served on the Council review committee.

For nomination forms and submittal information: On the District web page select <u>Resources and Help</u> from the menu and go to the listing for the 2012 Silver Beaver nominations (or just click on the big silver colored beaver in the upper left hand corner of the splash page). All nominations must be in to the committee by Nov 15.

Margee's Reminders for Eagle Scout Rank Applications



Margee Egan – NCAC's primary reviewer of Eagle Scout Rank Applications (ESRA) – has offered a few tidbit reminders to us; based on things she continues to see 'wrong' with ESRAs she gets from across the Council.

- a) Units should check <u>all</u> dates on the ESRA, and compare them to the records in ScoutNet by printing a "Scout record" and ensuring that all dates match.
 - 1. Frequently, ScoutNet reflects the Court of Honor date vice the Board of Review date or date on the Merit Badge blue card.
 - 2. Rank Advancements must reflect the Board of Review date.
 - 3. And for Merit Badges, the blue card date must be honored. (Think "Blue must Rule").
- b) On the ESRA, please list all elective merit badges in chronological order
- c) Date Joined Scouting: A boy becomes a Boy Scout the day his parents sign the youth application not the date he earns the Scout patch.

Search and Rescue: This merit badge – with 10 primary requirements – will test the Scout's knowledge of the field of search and rescue. Included in the material are elements of First Aide, the hazards faced by people in this field, and the four types of search and rescue teams. (Note: one of the requirements calls for the Scout to Complete the training for ICS-100, *Introduction to Incident Command System*.)

Kayaking: This merit badge – with 8 primary requirements – will test the Scout's knowledge of the sport of kayaking; including techniques for navigating varying types of waters, and the safety precautions practiced by smart kayakers. (Note: before doing the 'last' six' requirements, the Scout must successfully complete the BSA swimmer test.)

Welding: This merit badge – with 7 primary requirements – will test the Scout's knowledge of the welding profession, the techniques and safety standards employed across the industry.

Applications will not be considered after a lapse of 12 months from the date of the incident.



Veteran Unit Bar Award



Over the past 40 years, as scouting units have remained continuously chartered for longer and longer lengths of time, the Boy Scouts of America have introduced veteran unit bars. These cloth bars recognize units for their longevity.

There is a bar for every 5 years of charter, starting with 25 years. All bars are bronze with black numerals except for the 75 year bar introduced in 1985 and the 100 year bar introduced in 2010. The 75 year bar is red with silver numerals and the 100 year bar is red with gold numerals.

The bar is worn by all unit members, not just those that were members on the specific anniversary.

The bar is sewn on the uniform directly above the unit numerals. Units may choose to order custom one-piece unit numerals with the veteran bar included to reduce the number of patches to sew and ensure they are positioned correctly.

Not sure how old your unit is? Just check the first page or your rechartering packet and you'll find out how many months your unit has been around.

Veteran Award



The BSA Veteran award recognizes individual members for tenure in Scouting. The recognition item is a lapel pin denoting the number of years of service. This pin is worn only on civilian clothing and not on the Scout uniform.

The veteran award is an adult recognition only. However, tenure earned as a youth may be included in the total number of years registered.

- Scouters desiring recognition as veterans must have maintained an active registered relationship for the required number of years, paying the annual registration fee.
- The records of the national office and local council shall determine eligibility.
- The periods of service claimed for veteran recognition need not be continuous.

Pins (5 year to 90 year) can be purchased at the local scout shop or www.ScoutStuff.org after confirmation is received from national records. The application form can be found at: www.Scouting.org/filestore/membership/pdf/524-701.pdf

Operation Christmas Child is among a limited number of organizations that have received endorsement from the BSA National Council, which ensures Cub Scout and Boy Scout leaders that participation in OCC can be counted as one of their service projects. This year the Commonwealth of Virginia will allow Scouts age 16 & 17 to serve as "Election Pages." This program combines community service with an opportunity to observe democracy in action. Scouts who are bilingual or have sign language skills are especially valuable. Participants are placed according to home addresses into neighborhood precincts and usually work in pairs, either with another Scout or with a fellow High School student. Most will work between three and six hours. Upon completion of service, the Electoral Board presents each election page with a Certificate of Appreciation. Service may be applicable for classroom or meritbadge credit. As this is a non-partisan event, Scouts may wear their uniforms proudly and provide service to their community for this most sacred of franchises.

BSA Policy Statement on Political Activities




Boy Scouts of America policy prohibits Scouts from participating in political activities. BSA membership applications, under Program Policies, state: Citizenship activities are encouraged, but partisan political activities are prohibited.

Uniformed unit members and leaders may participate in flag ceremonies at political events and may lead the Pledge of Allegiance; however, they should retire after the ceremony and not remain on the speakers' platform or in a conspicuous location where television viewers could construe their presence as an endorsement or symbol of support. In addition, photos of candidates or Scouts in uniform or BSA marks and logos are not allowed in political campaign materials of any kind. Leaders must be alert to situations that would imply that the BSA favors one candidate over another. Strict observance of our long-standing policy against the active participation of uniformed Scouts and leaders in political events is mandatory.

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
Scout Law: Quotes for Life

www.Knoopenzo.nl (Knots etc.) is a Dutch website run by Theo Slijkerman, a member of the International Guild of Knot Tyers (*www.igkt.net*).

The website has a number of very interesting knotting resources, including calculators for working out the amount of rope needed for a rope mat (file idk103), a turks head (file idk108), and a braided ring (file idk118).

For pioneering, his square lashing calculator (file knt71)is pretty handy. Given the diameter of both poles (Dp and Db), and the thickness of the lashing rope (Dt), it will calculate the length of rope needed.

At the moment the website is only in Dutch but the author has used many illustrations so even if you can't read the text, you can follow the examples:

Adult Training Requirements for 2012



The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America has set the training requirements for all units to re-charter in 2012. For 2012 all Direct Contact Leaders must be trained in their positions. This means that if a leader has direct contact with a youth (i.e. outings, meetings, etc.) then they will have to be trained for their position. This includes all Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Crew Associate Advisors and their assistants, all Den Leaders (Tiger Cub, Wolf, Bear, and Webelos) and their assistants, and any other registered leaders that have contact with youth.

Notes:

- New leaders are required to complete **Youth Protection** training within 30 days of registering. It must be renewed every 2 years
- This Is Scouting is no longer required, it is now supplemental training.
- **Fast Start** training is no longer required.

Cub Scout Leader Specific Training



In Cub Scouting, specific training is offered for Cubmasters and assistants, pack committee members, Tiger Cub den leaders, Cub Scout den leaders and assistants, and Webelos den leaders and assistants. Purpose of the training is to:

- Learn the values, aims and history of Cub Scouting
- Learn the purpose and methods of Cub Scouting.
- Learn the specialized knowledge a leader needs to assume a leadership role within their Cub Scout pack
