Why do we do this?

"Scouting is not an abstruse or difficult science: rather it is a jolly game if you take it in the right light. At the same time it is educative, and (like Mercy) it is apt to benefit him that giveth as well as him that receiveth." Baden-Powell of Gilwell.

I have been digging into my copy of Aids to Scoutmastership once again. I find that the little book written by Baden-Powell in 1920 still holds water today. As BP makes clear in Aids to Scoutmastership, the book is not an instruction manual, rather it is a book outlining Why we do what we do in Scouting. And once we know why we are doing something it is easier to see the vision and achieve the goals or aims. I would encourage you to get a hard copy of this. Mine is full of notes and highlights.. a must for every Scoutmaster.

Seeing the vision and the understanding the goals are an important part of the Scoutmasters job. I think that too many Scoutmasters get caught in the "game" that they lose focus on the goal. Now, "the game" may be different in each unit and dependent on the leader. Some pay particular attention to advancement, while others focus on the outings. In most cases there is a good balance, but there still is a missing piece. That piece is the Aims and the Why we are playing this game with a purpose.

It is nice to watch as a Scout becomes and Eagle Scout. As a Scoutmaster, I love to sit and talk with a young man who has earned the Eagle Award. Like the leader that misses the true goal of Scouting though a young man may only think that he has achieved the highest rank. He may think that he is at the end of the journey because he is now an Eagle Scout. But that is not the case, he is far from done, he is just beginning.

In becoming an Eagle Scout he is starting to realize the vision and starting to grow in his manhood lifelong habits of good decision-making, life skills, leadership, and of course being a good citizen.

The other night I sat with a Scout in my troop for his Scoutmaster Conference. He has completed all of the requirements to earn his Eagle Award. Yes, he has completed all of the requirements, but he has actually become an Eagle Scout. In our discussion we talked more about the future and why he is going to be successful. He looked back at all of the challenges that got him to this point and I was happy to hear that instead of making them a negative thing, he looked back on them as learning points along his Scouting trail.

We talked about leadership. It has taken this Scout a little longer to develop into a leader, but he is there now and we talked about the different ways in which he developed those skills. It was important for me to remind him that in becoming an Eagle Scout he has demonstrated that he has what it takes to lead. The American public may not know much about Scouting other than helping old ladies across the street, but they all know that being an Eagle Scout is special. They look to Eagle Scouts to lead.

Where am I going with this?

We often lose the forest for the trees as they say. We make sure to teach camping skills and encourage Scouts to earn all the merit badges they can... but what of the Aims? What about the purpose of Scouting? I think that is what BP was reminding those leaders back in 1920 and he continues to remind us today... Stay focused on why we play this game with a purpose. It is not about Eagle Scouts. It is about Citizens of Character that are fit. The BSA reminds us in the mission statement that we are to teach young people to make ethical choices over their lifetimes. This is why we go camping, do service projects, earn merit badges and become Eagle Scouts.

I love digging in that old book. It gets me refocused on what is important.

Eagle Scout Yearbook



Yearbooks are priceless windows into the past, and the Eagle Scout Yearbook, Class of 2013 will be no exception. To make it happen, though, the National Eagle Scout Association needs your help to fill the yearbook's pages with the stories of the 56,841 young men who earned Eagle last year. If you or a young man you know earned the Eagle Scout rank in 2013, make sure you don't miss out on the chance to be a part of this momentous opportunity. The yearbook is an exciting new tradition started last year.

We normally associate yearbooks with high school, but the journey toward Scouting's highest honor has a lot in common with the journey toward graduation.

"We see getting the Eagle Scout rank as on par with getting a high school diploma," says Ryan Larson, associate director of NESA. "A yearbook lets these Eagle Scouts track this moment in history. They can look back 30 or 40 years from now at those memories."

If they haven't already, members of the 2013 Eagle Scout class will soon hear from the company that NESA commissioned to make the book, Publishing Concepts (PCI). Dallas-based PCI publishes directories for educational institutions, fraternities, sororities and military organizations across the nation. They've been around for 30 years, so they know what they're doing.

PCI will contact 2013 Eagle Scouts by phone, email or snail mail to gather information from these young men (name, Eagle project, favorite merit badge, dream job, favorite author and more). You can also get in touch with PCI directly at 1-800-395-4724. Remember, this is for 2013 Eagle Scouts only.

The number above is also the one to use if you prefer not to have certain information printed in the yearbook.

PCI will give these 2013 Eagle Scouts a chance to purchase the yearbook when they call. Note that only 2013 Eagle Scouts may purchase the 2013 Eagle Scout Yearbook, which should be shipped out around December 2014.

It's important to mention that this isn't a money-making scheme for the National Eagle Scout Association or the Boy Scouts of America. Profit from the book will go toward NESA scholarships. First Look at the Digital Technology Merit Badge



To borrow a phrase from a certain smartphone maker: The next big thing is almost here. Digital Technology merit badge, set to debut in mid-April 2014, will guide Scouts through the exciting, complex, ever-changing world of smartphone apps, computer software and tech-focused careers.

It's the Boy Scouts of America's latest in a growing roster of STEM-focused merit badges that help upgrade a Scout's skills for today's digitally focused workplaces. Digital Technology merit badge is debuting as Computers merit badge nears retirement. Computers MB came online in 1967 — long before anyone could've dreamed of a palm-size computer that also makes phone calls.

Scouts have until Dec. 31, 2014, to earn Computers merit badge. And yes, a Scout can earn and wear both Computers and Digital Technology merit badges. See more details about the phase-in and phase-out process at this link:

As for Digital Technology MB, it will include a Scout showing his merit badge counselor an up-to-date Cyber Chip. That's a requirement a Scout could complete now, if he wanted to be one-ninth of the way done. (And, besides, earning the Cyber Chip is a good idea for any Scout — even if he's not yet working on a merit badge that requires it.)

Other requirements will cover the Internet, smartphones, content creation on digital devices and much more. Potential merit badge counselors, get ready for Digital Technology to debut in mid-April.

New, Simplified Annual Health and Medical Record



Deciding which version of the BSA's Annual Health and Medical Record you need shouldn't raise your blood pressure.

And now you're getting a streamlined version of the BSA health forms and an easier-to-use website to accompany them. The site is the result of several BSA teams (professionals and volunteers) joining forces to make this process a painless one for you and other Scouters.

The Annual Health and Medical Record, www.scouting.org/scoutsource/HealthandSafety/ahmr.aspx, (hereafter AHMR) comes in several flavors, and until now some Scouters and parents found it a little difficult to determine which version of the AHMR they or their Scout/Venturer needed.

Taking your Cub Scouts on a local tour or your Boy Scouts on a two-night camping trip? The forms you'll need are different from those required on a camping trip lasting more than 72 hours.

Visiting the Florida Sea Base, Northern Tier, Philmont or the Summit? Be sure to print off some additional information to give your doctor.

It's all spelled out for you on the new site. Figuring out which forms you need is a snap thanks to logos, clear language and so-big-you-can't-miss-'em buttons you'll click to download the proper form.

Speaking of, you'll know you're using the right form if it says "2014 Printing" in the lower right corner.

If you've already gotten your physical using the old form, though, don't fret.

"The No. 1 concern/question I got this weekend relates to, 'Are my current valid medical records still valid?" says Richard Bourlon, BSA health and safety team leader. "It's most likely folks concerned we are going to make someone fill out a new physical exam when they planned to use one they just had done in December, for instance.

"We want to assure them they are still good — the old versions will be phased out over the next year, and everyone will basically have a new one in place next summer."

Answers to this question and others are found in the FAQs section of the AHMR website. Click the "Have Questions? Get Answers Here" button at the bottom of the page and read the FAQs. Your question may have already been answered.

There's more than a patch at stake, though. For the first time in two centuries, the current generation of children in America may have shorter life expectancies than their parents.

Sure, mom and dad play a vital role in their children's diet and exercise habits. But Scout leaders can make a difference, too. After all, you're with these kids one night a week and one weekend a month, typically. What you do at unit meetings and campouts matters.

Ask yourself: How active are your meetings? What snacks do you serve? What do Scouts drink?

The Boy Scouts of America has partnered with Healthy Kids Out of School to offer an incentive to reconsider your answers to those three questions.

Say hello to the Healthy Unit Patch, which encourages units to follow the BSA's SCOUTStrong recommendations at meetings, events and excursions.

- 3: Serve a fruit or vegetable at 3 meetings
- 6: Make water the main beverage at 6 meetings
- 9: Include 15 minutes of physical activity at 9 meetings

National Outdoor Awards Clarification



The National Outdoor Awards use the word "auspices" to describe qualifying activities. The question is what "auspices" means? Some people believe that this means that the requirements must be completed as part of organized unit activities and that any activity performed as an individual Scout, even if performed with the intent of earning the award, does not qualify.

Here's the clarification from Eric Hiser, member of the Camping Task Force who was also the designer and developer for the award. In other words, he knows of what he speaks.

"Under the auspices of the BSA" was language that was chosen deliberately. It means that the Scout participating in the activities did it as part of one of the following:

- 1. Any BSA unit activity (e.g., Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Venturing)
- 2. Any BSA-sanctioned individual activity (e.g., provisional summer camp, OA overnight with camping, camp staff, etc.)
- 3. Any activity undertaken as part of the referenced merit badge(s) for the badge or medal.

A "BSA unit activity" may include some individual efforts not part of the group: e.g., a pre-conditioning exercise where all unit members commit to and actually ride their bikes X miles a week prior to a big troop bike ride. It is not meant to include activities that the Scout undertakes that are unrelated to Scouting — e.g., family or church group camping, running as part of the school cross-country team, etc.

In some cases, an individual Scout could work toward a Scouting award and that could be counted at the discretion of the Scoutmaster. Such periods of time should be relatively short and focused on the award in question.

That seems pretty clear. If it's an activity he completes with his troop or team, it obviously qualifies. If it's part of a BSA individual program, such as Philmont's OA Trail Crew, that counts. If it's part of a Scout's work on merit badges like Hiking, Camping, Swimming, Cycling, Wilderness Survival, etc., it counts.

On the other hand, activities like practice with the school swim team, running during P.E. class or a family camping trip to a nearby state park wouldn't count.

Lifeguard Training



Do you want to get a cool lifeguard job this summer? Then you will need lifeguard certification training. Completing this course in May and June will earn you both BSA and American Red Cross Lifeguarding certifications. The prerequisite swim test is on May 18. The course is then held on June 7 & 8 and June 14 & 15 (both weekends). You must be at least 15 years old to complete the course and must be a storng swimmer. The deadline for registration is May 12 so register soon by visiting www.NCACBSA.org/Aquatics.

Scuba BSA



Scuba BSA introduces participants to the special skills, equipment, and safety precautions associated with scuba diving, encourages aquatics activities that promote fitness and recreation, and provides a foundation for those who later will participate in more advanced underwater activities.

The Scuba BSA experience contains two parts – Knowledge Development and Water Skills Development. During the first part, participants learn basic dive safety information and overview skills to be used during their water experience. The Water Skills Development session introduces essential dive skills, such as mask clearing, regulator clearing, and alternate air source use.

This is an introductory, try-it scuba experience. It does not result in certification for diving on your own. It is not the BSA Scuba Diving merit badge. Many people decide to go on and take a certification course after trying scuba.

The one and a half hour Scuba BSA sessions start hourly at 1, 2:30, 4, and 5:30 pm. This is for any scout-aged youth or adult. Maximum of 8 participants per one hour session. Preregistration is required, each participant must complete a medical questionnaire.

All you need to bring is your swimsuit, a towel, and a scuba medical statement (page 9 of the BSA Annual Health and Medical Record).

When: June 15, Camp Snyder pool.

Cost: \$25 (includes all equipment)

Registration deadline: June 9

Pre-Camp Swim Classification Tests



This is an opportunity for your unit to have your annual BSA swim classification check done under the supervision of NCAC-approved aquatics personnel at the Camp William B. Snyder pool. A unit swim classification record will be issued by NCAC Aquatics personnel to each unit showing the swim classification (swimmer, beginner, non-swimmer) of each participant. This event is open to all NCAC units.

Units must register online at *www.NCACBSA.org/Aquatics* for a 30 minute block. Up to 20 tests can be administered during a block. The date is Saturday, June 8 and available times start at 1:00pm, 1:30, 2:00, 2:30, 3:00, 3:30, 4:00, 4:30pm. Cost is \$2 per participant. Minimum preregistration is 10 per unit.

Note: Although these swim tests are being conducted prior to summer camp, the camp aquatics director is expected to review or retest any Scout or leader whose skills appear to be inconsistent with his classification. Additionally, the camp aquatics program director is authorized to retest any Scout or group of Scouts at his discretion. Goshen Scout Camp waterfronts require swim classification tests to be conducted at Goshen in Lake Merriweather.



The Best Backpacking Backpack Review



They picked versatile packs that an average person would use on trips of two to eight days, but are also capable of going up to a twenty two day trips (yes, they used some of these packs on trips that long). The packs they tested were load 'em up and charge type packs, not to be confused with ultralight frameless packs. They tested these packs everywhere from week-long hikes on the Pacific Northwest coast to cold weather, high altitude mountaineering on Denali. Wilderness First Aid Classes



Beginning in 2014, BSA High Adventure crews attending Philmont Scout Ranch are required to have two members currently certified in Wilderness First Aid (WFA). The requirement for the other Bases (Northern Tier, Sea Base and The Summit) remains at one crew member currently WFA-trained, but two are strongly suggested since the crew would have to end their trip if the one trained person was injured. Also new in 2014 is the requirement that any unit undertaking a back country trip of their own have at least one WFA-trained participant.

NCAC Powder Horn 2014




