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

The Authority of Youth Leadership

Compel

Force or oblige someone to do something.

Delegate

To give or commit (duties, powers, etc) to another as agent or representative.

Empowered

Give someone the authority or power to do something.

The authority of youth leadership is not based in compelling young people to do something.

The authority in youth leadership is not delegated (One abiding myth of Scouting is that the adults are the source of all authority and delegate responsibility to youth leadership.)

The authority of youth leadership is built into the fabric of Scouting, they are empowered to lead.

Youth leaders are not servants, employees, or soldiers but volunteer players in the purposeful game of Scouting.

Scouting is something that Scouts do for themselves and adults have the honor of observing, coaching and encouraging.

Adult oversight is cooperative; we are there to aid our youth leaders by doing only the things they, by reason of their age, cannot do.

Adult authority is provisional; we are there to assure things are safe, and that our youth leaders are playing within the bounds of the game.

Adult leadership is responsive and reciprocal to youth leadership: we provide assistance to developing leaders in the same way we teach someone to ride a bike, by letting go when they are ready to pedal on their own.


The camp presenter arrives early and sets up display boards. He'll greet families as your unit gathers and discuss camp options. We then ask for 2-3 minutes, after your Pack opening, for the presenter to address the Pack. He'll not only talk about Day and Twilight camp, but the other excellent camps available – like Camp Snyder and Goshen Scout Reservations (Webelos Only.) After a quick Q&A session, the presenter will turn the meeting back over to the Cubmaster, but be available to answer specific family questions. BSA Acquires Scoutbook, the Popular Advancement Tracking Web App



With a tap on your phone you can deposit a check, update your family grocery list or share a photo. Shouldn't keeping track of a Scout's advancement be just as easy? The Boy Scouts of America thinks so. That's why the BSA has acquired Scoutbook, the revolutionary web app that makes tracking advancement easier, faster and more fun. That means more time for you and your Scouts to enjoy those life-changing experiences they can't get anywhere but Scouting.

Imagine updating your Boy Scouts' progress toward a rank or a merit badge with a couple of taps or clicks. Or letting Scouts input and provide proof for their own advancement progress. Or seeing at a glance which adventures your Cub Scouts lack for the next rank. Or knowing which of your unit leaders still need to complete BSA training. Or getting an automatically generated shopping list to make your trip to the Scout Shop a breeze. Or never again wondering whether you're using the most up-to-date BSA requirements.

And imagine doing it all wherever you are and on the devices you use every day. Scoutbook is an app, but it's a web app. That means you'll be able to use it if you have an iPhone, Android phone, Windows Phone, BlackBerry — or even (gasp!) your PC or tablet.

There's nothing to download. You'll just type the URL, **www.Scoutbook.com**, into your browser on a smartphone, tablet or computer. The secure website knows which device you're using, so it'll load in a format that looks great on screens big and small.

Scoutbook currently is designed for Cub Scout, Boy Scout. and Venturing units. Is it free, no (or at least not yet, there is a good deal of talk about this replacing Internet Advancement now that it is officially owned by BSA). There are several pricing options starting at \$10 a year. Full pricing information is available at Scoutbook.com.

The BSA expects to integrate Scoutbook seamlessly into the BSA's membership system, ScoutNet, later this year.

2015 Guide to Advancement



The 2015 *Guide to Advancement*, your official source for administering advancement in all Boy Scouts of America programs, is now available. To view or download the PDF go to: www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/33088.pdf

Every Scouter should be at least familiar with the *Guide to Advancement* and how to use it to answer our questions on the wide-ranging method in our programs. Only the very fastidious will read every word, but we should all be able to find our way around in it.

Besides revisions for the new Cub Scout and Venturing advancement programs, there are several significant changes and clarifications, and most of the changes pertain to the Boy Scout program. Many of the new sections are the result of frequently asked questions that the Advancement team is answering through new policies. Here's a summary:

- There's a clarification that merit badge worksheets and other written work are not to be substituted for the active requirements such as "show", "demonstrate" and "tell".
 Worksheets may be fine for a Scout to organize his material, but when meeting with the counselor, the requirements must be met as stated. (Section 4.2.0.1)
- A Scoutmaster conference must be held face-to-face, not via an online meeting system such as Skype or FaceTime. These teleconference systems weaken the method of Adult Association and could make youth protection and privacy standards harder to enforce. (Section 4.2.3.5)
- Lists of merit badge counselors are not intended to be provided directly to Scouts, and the Advancement Team is emphasizing that this includes online access to lists. A Scout should be referred to one or more counselors by his Scoutmaster during the discussion that accompanies the issuance of the blue card. (Section 7.0.2.3)
- Merit badge instruction is not to be provided in large sessions but rather one-on-one
 with the Scout, and preferably with a Scout buddy, or in certain circumstances in small
 groups where the instructor can personally interact with each Scout. (Section 7.0.3.0)
- There's a clarification on merit badges which contain prerequisites, such as earning
 another badge as one of the requirements. It's made clear that the prerequisite does
 not need to be satisfied before work on the merit badge begins. The example given is
 the case of the Emergency Preparedness merit badge, which requires the First Aid
 merit badge to also be completed. It need not be earned prior to starting work on
 Emergency Preparedness. (Section 7.0.4.11)
- Not that it happens often, but it's made clear that other youth observers besides the
 candidate are not allowed at boards of review. The unit leader can be there to
 introduce the candidate and explain anything the board asks, but the board has the
 right to exclude any and all other observers including the unit leader. (Section 8.0.1.0)
 But 8.0.1.0 states that parents of the Scout must be allowed to observe if they
 absolutely insist, and Section 10.2.2.0 provides for assistance for special-needs
 Scouts.
- Even though Scoutmaster conferences are intended to be held in person, there's new guidance for holding boards of review by videoconferencing mechanisms, such as when a Scout is away at college and a timely board of review must be held. (Section 8.0.1.6)
- The official Eagle Scout rank application is the only form permitted to be used. This is to prevent possible use of obsolete online forms or local council versions of the national form. (Section 9.0.1.3)
- A section is added on "crowdfunding" for Eagle Scout service projects. This involves
 use of such services as Indiegogo or Kickstarter. The language makes clear that
 traditional fundraising methods are preferred (if fundraising is even necessary) and
 includes a caution that the terms and conditions of the crowdfunding service may be at
 odds with BSA policies. (Section 9.0.2.10)

What's in the pack meeting plans?

- · A list of materials you'll need before the meeting
- Opening ceremony script
- Audience participation activities and songs
- Script for presenting recognition items and rank advancement
- Cubmaster's minute idea
- Closing ceremony

Some tips for using these pack meeting plans the right way

- Pack meeting plans do not have to be done in any special order, but it is recommended that you include all of the points of the Scout Law each year. Your annual pack planning meeting would be a good time to determine the order.
- 2. There are pack meeting plans for multiple years posted on the website. It is your pack's choice of which one to select from each point of the Scout Law for each year.
- 3. Pack meetings should not last longer than an hour. Adjust the plan to make it fit within the time. Research and experience tells us that Cub Scouts have a hard time sitting still for that long. Keep the meetings fun, active, and engaging. An hour long presentation of awards should be avoided at all costs, find ways of presenting awards in groups if necessary to get to the FUN stuff.

Scouts Riding on Parade Floats or Trailers in a Parade



The BSA typically prohibits transporting passengers in the backs of trucks or on trailers, but that rule may be tempered for parade floats or hayrides, as long as the following points are strictly followed to prevent injuries: Transportation to and from the site is not allowed on the truck or trailer; persons riding, whether seated or standing, must be able to hold on to something stationary; legs should not hang over the side. (*from the BSA Health and Safety Team*).

Is your Scout a Complete Angler?



If a Boy Scout you know loves fishing, here's his chance to prove it.

The BSA Complete Angler Recognition honors Boy Scouts who earn all three fishing-related merit badges: Fishing, Fly-Fishing and Fish and Wildlife Management.

The recognition was developed by the BSA National Fishing Task Force and replaces the Certified Angler Award. Unlike that previous award, the Complete Angler Recognition doesn't require an online test. Once a boy earns the three merit badges, he's eligible to receive the patch.

The program is supported by the BSA Supply Group, which will deliver the newly designed, controlled-access patch to Scout Shops. (Controlled-access means you can't buy it online because you'll need to prove a boy is eligible to earn it.)

Adults, there's a new fishing patch for you, too. The BSA Certified Angling Instructor courses help you deliver a fishing experience Scouts won't forget.

SCOUTStrong Healthy Unit Award gets Updated



Is snacking smart, drinking right and moving more a priority in your Scout unit? It should be. And it's time to get the patch to prove it.

The Boy Scouts of America, in collaboration with Healthy Kids Out of School, has launched a new edition of the SCOUTStrong Healthy Unit Award. Originally a pilot program in the northeast, it is now available nationwide in a new edition.

Who can earn it?

The patch is for Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Venturers. You can earn it as a den, troop, pack or crew.

How do you earn it?

Practice three healthy principles during your meetings and/or gatherings, creating a new norm. Just follow the 3-6-9 plan:

- Snack Smart: Eat fruits and vegetables for snacks when snacks are provided at three meetings
- Drink Right: Have water over sugary beverages at six meetings
- Move More: Enjoy 15 minutes of physical activity at nine meetings

Best part is, the three healthy meeting practices align with many existing Scout requirements and awards. For example, the Cooking merit badge. A Boy Scout could provide his troop with a healthy snack that he prepared and mark off that requirement while also helping his troop earn the award.

What resources are available?

There's a ton of great content available on the SCOUTStrong Healthy Unit Award page (www.scouting.org/ScoutStrongHealthyUnit.aspx). Such as:

- Customized tracker for each level of Scouting (Tigers through Boy Scouts), in order to track your unit's progress toward earning the patch.
- Ideas for active games, healthy snacks and activities to get Scouts on board with the healthy practices.
- Resources for Scout parents or volunteers that introduce the patch and provide ideas for easy and healthy snacks to bring to meetings.

What's new about this award?

The new version of this award has two big differences:

- The patch has been redesigned.
- Instead of sending your completed tracking form to the Healthy Kids Out
 of School team, you're now on the honor system. After completing the
 requirements, you may print the certificate yourself and buy the patches
 yourself.

What do I do once my unit earns the award?

FEMA Mobile Application



FEMA has added a new feature to its free app that will enable users to receive weather alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five locations across the nation. This new feature allows users to receive alerts on severe weather happening anywhere they select in the country, even if the phone is not located in the area, making it easy to follow severe weather that may be threatening family and friends.

The new weather alert feature adds to the app's existing features to help Americans through emergencies. In addition to this upgrade, the app also provides a customizable checklist of emergency supplies, maps of open shelters and Disaster Recovery Centers, and tips on how to survive natural and manmade disasters. The FEMA app also offers a "Disaster Reporter" feature, where users can upload and share photos of disaster damage.

Some other key features of the app include:

- Safety Tips: Tips on how to stay safe before, during, and after over 20 types of hazards, including floods, hurricanes, tornadoes and earthquakes
- Disaster Reporter: Users can upload and share photos of damage and recovery efforts
- Maps of Disaster Resources: Users can locate and receive driving directions to open shelters and disaster recovery centers
- Apply for Assistance: The app provides easy access to apply for federal disaster assistance

The latest version of the FEMA app is available for free in the App Store for Apple devices and Google Play for Android devices. Users who already have the app downloaded on their device should download the latest update for the weather alerts feature to take effect. The new weather alerts feature in the FEMA app does not replace Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) function available on many new smartphones. WEAs have a special tone and vibration and are sent for emergencies such as extreme weather. AMBER alerts, or Presidential Alerts.

The 'No One-On-One Contact' Provision Applies to Digital Contact, Too



The BSA's Youth Protection guidelines prohibit one-one-one contact between adults and youth members. That much you know. But in a world where an increasing number of our communications are digital, how does that rule apply?

The policy of two-deep leadership extends into cyberspace. There should be no one-on-one online or digital activities (games, social media, etc.) or electronic communications. Leaders should include or copy a parent or another leader in all online communications, ensuring no one-on-one contact exists in text, social media or other forms of online or digital communication.

Our partners at the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) NetSmartz Workshop program advise us child predators are knowledgeable about BSA's polices regarding two-deep leadership and no one-on-one contact. As a result, they seek interactions with youth in cyberspace where youth interact with each other and are usually unsupervised by parents (i.e., gaming, chat rooms, etc.)

As a safety precaution to protect youth and leaders, we require all interactions (e.g., texting, email, instant messaging, etc.) to be copied to a parent or other registered leader. While we understand that this may present a challenge to some, we feel that safe interactions are of prime concern.

As a reminder, all leaders should be providing the Cyber Chip program to Scouting youth so that they may be better able to recognize, respond to and report inappropriate activity to the CyberTipline (1-800-THE-LOST (843-5678)) and local Scout executive. To help families and volunteers keep youth safe while online, the BSA introduced the Cyber Chip.

We also recommend that Eagle Scout coaches who are selected by units become registered. By registering these key leaders in the growth of our Scouts, they would then be properly vetted through background checks and would be required to take Youth Protection training. What better way to ensure the safety of all our youth, than by asking all adults involved with the advancement of these Scouts to be a part of our safety programs?

Here's How Cub Scouts Will Earn Nova Awards under the New Program



How will Cub Scouts earn Nova Awards once the Academics and Sports belt loops go away? Richard Stone, the education and training leader of the STEM/Nova Committee, has the answer.

Effective June 1, 2015, the rank requirements for Cub Scouts are changing. Cub Scouts currently working on any of the Nova awards or one of the Supernova awards have two options:

1. Complete the award not later than Dec. 31, 2015, using the requirements as published in the current Cub Scout Nova Awards Guidebook (No. 34032). These "old" requirements include the earning of the soon-to-be retired activity pins and belt loops. Cub Scouts may still earn those awards after their retirement from the advancement requirements on June 1 and may receive the pin or belt loop while they are still in stock at your local Scout Shop (Goose Creek Editor Note: Most likely these will not be available from our Scout Shops). The retired awards may not be applied to the new Cub Scout advancement requirements, of course.

Or complete the award using the requirements published in the new Cub Scout Nova Awards Guidebook. Look for the updated Cub Scout Nova award and Supernova Award requirements at this page

www.scouting.org/stem/Awards.aspx and in the updated guidebooks available at your Scout Shop this summer.

2014 Eagle Scout Yearbook



The 2014 Eagle Scout Yearbook, which will showcase the 51,820-member 2014 Eagle Scout class. If you or someone you know is a member of the 2014 Eagle Scout class, here are the details you need.

Like any school or university yearbook, the 2014 Eagle Scout Yearbook will feature names and pictures of members of the 2014 class. But like any class yearbook, it's only as good as the information provided.

2014 Eagle Scouts will receive a postcard, email and/or phone call from PCI, the company producing the yearbook for NESA. Eagle Scouts will be asked to submit a photo and answer questions like, "Whom do you most admire?" "What was your toughest merit badge?" "What does the Scout Law mean to you?" They'll also describe their Eagle project. The yearbook will be available for purchase when providing this information. Eagle Scouts who do not participate will have only their first name and last initial and troop number included.

Proceeds from the yearbook help fund the NESA scholarship endowment. Over the past seven years, the NESA scholarship fund has increased from 75 scholarships valued at \$250,000 to more than 250 scholarships valued at \$650,000 through projects like the Eagle Scout Yearbook.

Eagle Scouts who submit a photo for the yearbook get a patch like the one seen to the left of this article. You don't have to buy a yearbook to get your name and photo in the yearbook or get a patch.

Summit Bechtel Reserve is Seeking Photos of You as a Scout



Crack open the photo albums and grab that shoebox full of images.

The Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia is seeking portraits of Scouts for a new exhibit at the Scott Visitor Center. These Scout portraits — spanning the years from 1910 to today — will form a permanent display at the new building, scheduled to open this October.

About 75 photos will be selected to represent Scouting's past and its present, and one of them could be of you.

The team mostly needs photos from before the 1990s — aka the time you might have been a youth in Scouting.

Here are the details on how to submit:

Photo requirements

- It should be a close-up portrait of a single individual, preferably from the torso up. In other words, not an action shot.
- The Scout in the photo should be in uniform.
- It should be from before 1990, but more recent photos will be considered.
- You may send a lower-resolution image initially, but the photo should be available at a very high resolution.
- If your photo is selected, the team will ask for a high-resolution image and may ask to borrow the original photo in order to make a scan of it. (Scanned photos will be returned.)
- Photos should be submitted by May 5, 2015.

How to submit

Let's Stop the Practice of Having Scouts Sing for a Lost Item



Let's say a Scout loses something — perhaps his Boy Scout Handbook, troop cap or camp chair — and you find it.

Do you:

- A. Return the item to him right away, with a quick, discreet (but in full view of others) reminder that he should keep a better eye on his stuff?
- B. Give the item to his patrol leader or senior patrol leader and let one of them return it to the Scout with the same friendly, discreet reminder?
- C. Keep the item until he can "sing for it" in front of the whole unit, thereby shaming him into never making the mistake again?

The right answers are A or B.

If you said C — singing for the lost item — Dr. Jim Wilson, none other than the national chairman of the BSA's Youth Protection Committee, asks you to rethink that practice.

Singling out a Scout in front of other Scouts is inappropriate and can be damaging to that Scout. I would suggest following up with the Scout to see if he is OK. Also, the Scout's parents should be informed, if they haven't been already.

This practice is actually promoting an environment of harassment and bullying. It can put the Scout at greater risk of being bullied, encourage other Scouts to single out and bully others, and create a cycle of bullying (in which even those who were bullied start bullying others).

In fact, it is recommended even in bullying situations not to single out anyone publicly, including the person who engaged in bullying behavior. It's better to address the situation after everyone has had time to cool off.

I suggest you check out the information sheets available in the "Bullying Awareness" section of the Youth Protection website (www.scouting.org/Training/YouthProtection/bullying.aspx).

What is STEM SCOUTS?



STEM Scouts is a national pilot program from the Boy Scouts of America (BSA), focused on fun ways for girls and boys, grades 3 - 12, to learn more about science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Using hands-on activities, STEM Scouts also encourages young minds' natural curiosity and helps build interest in the STEM-related careers that are so crucial to our future economy.

STEM Scouts offers a scouting experience with less emphasis on the outdoors. STEM Scouts follow the Scout oath and law with the goal of producing young men and women who are leaders, display confidence, realize their skills and limitations, are respectful of others' opinions, are problem solvers in all aspects of life, look for opportunities to serve others, are good citizens and demonstrate integrity in all phases of life.

The BSA launched the STEM Scouts pilot program in 2014 in Knoxville, Tennessee, giving youth – both boys and girls – a new way to learn about STEM outside of the classroom. After successfully piloting the program, the BSA's National Executive Board approved a plan to expand the STEM Scouts pilot to 12 additional councils (NCAC is not on this list).

STEM Scouts at a Glance

- 10-30 boys and girls, 2 or more leaders per unit (called a Laboratory, usually shorted to Lab)
- Units grouped by elementary, middle and high school ages
- Weekly after-school meetings, monthly field trips
- 4- to 6-week learning modules
- There are no ranks or badges, but youth receive participation awards for weekly activities and achievement awards for completing Individual Learning Modules
- Lessons created & vetted by STEM educators
- Leadership and mentoring opportunities
- Development of new skills

Some example modules from the pilot:

- Mad About Gravity (elementary school): How does gravity work? Learn how a parachute slows down a falling egg. Create a real-life "Angry Birds" game, participate in an egg drop challenge and launch your own designed rocket.
- Robot Race (middle school): Using Lego Mindstorms NXT 2.0, design, build and program a robot that can pick up and move ping pong balls. Compete against your fellow STEM Scouts to see whose robot gets the iob done fastest.
- Forensic Science (high school): Solve a murder mystery by applying forensic science techniques. Conduct gel electrophoresis as you explore DNA and how it applies to forensic science. Investigate blood typing activities using simulated blood. Learn how to lift fingerprints and take casts of footprints.

Pre Camp Swim Tests



This is an opportunity for your unit to have your annual BSA swim classification check done under the supervision of NCAC-approved aquatics personnel at the Camp William B. Snyder pool.

When: June 6. 30 min blocks starting at 1pm, last session starting at 4:30pm. Up to 20 tests per 30 minute session

Where: Camp William B. Snyder

Cost: \$2 per participant

Note: Although these swim tests are being conducted prior to summer camp, the camp aquatics director is expected to review or retest any Scout or leader whose skills appear to be inconsistent with his classification. Additionally, the camp aquatics program director is authorized to retest any Scout or group of Scouts at his discretion. Goshen Scout Reservation waterfronts require swim classification tests be conducted at Goshen in Lake Merriweather.

A unit swim classification record will be issued by NCAC Aquatics personnel to each unit showing the swim classification (swimmer, beginner, and non-swimmer) of each participant.

2015 Fredericksburg National Cemetery Luminaria



More than 15,300 candles will light the Fredericksburg National Cemetery for the twentieth annual luminaria honoring those who have given their lives for their country.

This commemoration will take place Saturday May 23, 2015 (rain date, Sunday, May 24). The program extends from 8:00 pm to 11:00 pm in the cemetery. It will remain open until the luminaria lights are out.

The program includes a historical walking tour to view the thousands of lighted candles. Each honors one of the soldiers buried in the cemetery, situated atop the battlefield landmark known during and after the Civil War as Marye's Heights. Taps will be played every 30 minutes.

Due to limited parking, a free shuttle service will operate from the University of Mary Washington parking-lot on the corner of William Street and Sunken Road. Handicapped parking will be available in the parking lot behind the Fredericksburg Battlefield Visitor Center, with another shuttle operating between that point and the cemetery.

Please note that the National Park does not allow pets in the cemetery.

- You must demonstrate the following at the prerequisite swim test: swim continuously for 550 yards, including at least 100 yards of each of the following strokes in good form: front crawl, breaststroke, elementary backstroke, and sidestroke. Immediately following the swim you must tread water for two minutes using no hands (your hands must be under your armpits).
- You must be able to, starting in the water, swim 20 yards using a front crawl or breaststroke, surface dive 7-10 feet, retrieve a 10-pound object, surface, swim with the object 20 yards back to the starting point, and exit the water, all within 1 minute, 40 seconds.

What do you need to bring:

- You must supply a BSA Annual Health and Medical Record form signed by a physician. You must be approved for swimming activities
- You will need to furnish a swim mask, snorkel and fins (all other equipment is provided)
- You will need to bring a bag lunch for each day of the weekend sessions.

The Scouts learn and practice leadership skills and styles together.

The course is presented primarily using a Boy Scout model as the vehicle which allows all attendees to SEE how leadership skills fit into the scouting program. These Leadership skills are applicable to all scouting programs.

While it remains the responsibility of the unit leaders to train the youth leaders, this course is designed to supplement the adult leaders' role in the training process. NYLT skills build on the fundamental leadership skills presented in the unit basic leadership training in their home unit. This training conference has six specific objectives:

- To give participants the confidence and knowledge to run their unit.
- To give participants the most contemporary, successful, and useful leadership tools available and allow them to "experiment" with them to help them better relate these skills to their unit responsibilities.
- To give participants the opportunity to share ideas and experiences with Scouts from other scouting programs.
- To create an atmosphere where Scouts will experience Scouting at its best.
- To enhance the relationship between the participant and their adult leaders. To have fun!

Paddleboarding Buying Guide





Books

The Ashley Book of Knots



The Ashley Book of Knots (c.1944) by Clifford W. Ashley, is the definitive reference work on knots, splices, and rope work in general. Born in 1881 in New Bedford, Massachusetts, Clifford W. Ashley was an antique dealer and artist, who spent eleven years writing his magnum opus and died three years after its 1944 publication.

In his pursuit of ropework, Mr. Ashley spent six months at sea on the whaling bark SUNBEAM; and six weeks on a Delaware Bay oysterman called a 'bugeye'. He interviewed tradesmen, such as: steeplejacks, cobblers, truck drivers, butchers, electric linesmen, and Boy Scouts as well as sailors and sea captains to document each nuance of knot unique to its trade. He was taught a few knots by Mr. Ringling himself of circus fame; and taught a knot to Mr. DuPont, a captain of industry.

The result of Mr. Ashley's research was a significant collection of 7,000 drawings of 3,900 knots and their application in a 620 page knot tyers tome which has become a veritable bible for rope workers the world over. In just about any capacity that a rope can be utilized has found its way into the book. Mr. Ashley has covered: netting, lashings, block & tackle, splices, hitches, and bends. He went from purely decorative knots with no practical value to knots applied to industrial use. He included a whole chapter on rope tricks and puzzles. There is an amusing catalog of small figures the author drew to rate the quality of each knot described, such as a deuce of clubs to designate 'unimportance', or a kedge anchor to indicate 'reliability'.

Equally important as the knot's description was their utilization on incidental equipment. Mr. Ashley fortuitously included a description of a rope's application on fairleads, belaying pins, H-bitts, cleats, thumb-cleats, fife rails, pin rails, pin racks, and timberheads; as well as esoteric equipment such as euphroe blocks and crows foots.

The book also includes the important distinction between the kevel (or cavil) and the quarter cleat. The glossary in the back makes another refinement by distinguishing the knot from the sinnet, splice, hitch, and bend. Thus clearing up any misassumptions in knot application (such as that Knot Theory is a branch of pure mathematics and has nothing to do with Knot Tying!) - *The Ashley Book of Knots* settles any disputes in nomenclature.

The only shortcoming to this significant work is that the drawings are unclear and vague in some instances, making it impossible to tie a knot in the example given. The book is dated in respect to splicing modern power braids such as Liquid Crystal Polymer, Spectra, or Kevlar; and makes no mention of the type of knot or splice found in an Astronaut's tether.

Still this can be tolerated in view of the wealth of information and history on knots, splices, and rope contained within its pages. And *The Ashley Book of Knots* has gained a further importance in its power of verification.

Cost is around \$52, hardcover. The Amazon rating for this book is 4.8 stars out of 220 reviews.

NCAC Powder Horn 2015



Powder Horn is a resource course designed to introduce Scouting's leaders/advisors and scouts to the exciting program possibilities for their unit. The goal for participants is to leave the Powder Horn course with a list of ideas to help their program, along with contacts and resources needed to implement them.

It is important to understand that Powder Horn is not a personal development course or a team building experience. It is not a certification course and no high adventure skills are taught in this course.

Its purpose is to educate the scouts and Scouting leaders about specific highadventure skills, to connect them to resources to deliver those skills, and to get them excited about delivering those skills in an exciting, challenging way to youth. It is designed to have many disciplines introduced with a hands-on segment.

Course Method

During the course, presentations on topics are made by knowledgeable consultants with demonstrated skills and certifications, as appropriate. They demonstrate the skills required and explain where resources, such as equipment, facilities, guides, instructors, and certifications can be obtained locally. Most of the presentations involve actual hands-on experience by the participants, including, shooting sports, kayaking, canoeing, fishing, mountain biking, SCUBA, land navigation, Leave No Trace, Project COPE, wilderness survival and much, much more.

This is NOT a high-adventure activity. Under NO CIRCUMSTANCES are Powder Horn participants required to participate in an activity where they feel uncomfortable. They may choose to observe, listen, and learn.

Learning Objectives

Completion of Powder Horn will result in understanding the skills, equipment, facilities, & certifications needed to conduct specific high-adventure programs, such as:

- provide a robust outdoor program using a variety of resources
- identify local resources and consultants for high-adventure activities
- apply the health and safety requirements of the BSA to the outdoor programs
- apply the rules and regulations of the BSA as they apply to outdoor programs

If Wood Badge is a Scouting bachelor's degree, consider this the master's.

The Philmont Leadership Challenge (PLC) and Summit Leadership Challenge (SLC) represent the next step in your training as a Scout leader. These courses hone the skills taught in Wood Badge in an outdoor experiential learning environment. They underscore the values of Scouting and teamwork and promote the concepts of servant leadership. Leadership Challenge is a very special experience. You will camp in a team setting that enables participants to use their leadership skills to resolve challenging situations.

At PLC or SLC, you'll internalize and hone leadership skills in an action-packed backcountry conference. You'll join other like-minded Scouters and learn teamwork, practice servant leadership and gain new ideas for improving your Scout unit.

The courses are open to Scouters in all programs. The Philmont course and the Summit course are similar but not identical. They teach the same leadership skills and use the same learning modules, but because of their unique locations each course has a slightly different itinerary.

What are the prerequisites?

- You must have completed the practical portion of Wood Badge, though you may still be working on the ticket. Actually, taking the Leadership Challenge is a great ticket item.

CPR/AED Pro and First Aid Training

Leave No Trace Trainer Courses and Master Educator Course



The **LNT Trainer** course is designed to enhance your understanding of Leave No Trace practices and ethics and to increase your level of expertise and confidence in teaching Leave No Trace skills. Through focused activities, hands-on field experience and both formal and informal discussions, you will be introduced to concepts and methods that will advance your knowledge of Leave No Trace issues, expand your repertoire of low-impact skills and increase your effectiveness in teaching these important skills to others.

On completion of this course, participants will be registered as Leave No Trace Trainers with the national Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics and will receive a certificate of course completion as well as their Leave No Trace Trainer lapel pin.

The **LNT Master Educator** course is a five-day course (split over two weekends) trains Scouts and Scouters ages 18 and up to serve as Leave No Trace Master Educators. Master Educators can conduct Leave No Trace Trainer courses (two-day) and awareness workshops (one-day or shorter).

This invaluable training is recognized and highly regarded throughout the world, especially by the outdoor industry, as well as government land management agencies. Successful graduates are certified to train others in Leave No Trace skills and ethics. The Master Educator Course provides participants with a comprehensive training in Leave No Trace skills and ethics through practical application in a field-based setting. The first weekend is a mix of classroom and outdoor instruction, introducing the course and schedule, providing in-depth information on the overall Leave No Trace program, how to conduct training courses, and the science behind the Leave No Trace principles. The second weekend is spent in the field on a short backcountry trip, learning and practicing Leave No Trace skills and techniques hands-on.

Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills



This course is aimed at all adults working with older youth regardless of program (Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, Venturer, or Explorer). This training IS NOT recommended for Cub Scout leaders. All participants must have completed Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills, as well as the position-specific training for their program area (Venturing or, Varsity or, Boy Scout) prior to attending this course and be able to meet physical requirements of the BSA Annual Health & Medical Record.

The target audience is leaders planning High Adventure treks at backcountry venues not supported by BSA infrastructure; however, units planning to attend High Adventure bases supported by BSA will find this course useful, inasmuch as unit shakedowns will, most likely, take place in venues not supported by BSA infrastructure.

Part 1 — Addresses ways to effectively work with older youth and covers the detailed preparation and planning that must be done before you go out including risk management. Summarizes the personal and crew equipment used for lightweight camping. Plans are also made for the weekend overnight session.

Part 2 — Participants will practice core leader skills for the outdoor program — Leave No Trace, navigation (map & compass plus GPS), terrain awareness, expedition menu planning and food preparation, stove and stove maintenance, wilderness first aid issues, expedition health and hygiene, team building. Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills is offered by the Council Training Committee as an optional follow-on to the basic course, Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills.

Wood Badge



Wood Badge is designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of all Scouters, in all leadership positions for the BSA. The Wood Badge course incorporates the traditions of over 80 years of Wood Badge, while adding the management and leadership training necessary to become a successful leader in the 21st Century.

Wood Badge is more than a classroom; it's entertaining, fun games, hands-on projects, team building, and inspirational events. You will come away with an appreciation of Scouting's heritage, as well as a vision of the role you will play in its future, and the impact you will make on the youth in your own unit, the district and our council. Participation in this course will provide skills to help you achieve success in other aspects of your life or in your career! The course starts with a 2-weekend, fun-filled practical training period where the Scouter lives as a member of a team progressing through Scouting, and learning the skills of leadership. The outdoor experience is followed by a period of up to eighteen months during which the Scouter applies the skills learned during the practical experience in his or her Scouting position – at the unit, district, or council level. Through this period, each Scouter is assigned a counselor who acts as a resource, evaluator, and Scouting mentor to assist the participant in putting into action those points discussed during the course. This is demonstrated by the process known as "working your ticket."

Prerequisite Training for Wood Badge:

Complete the basic training courses for your primary Scouting position. Cub Leaders must have completed New Leader Essentials and the position specific training for their position. Boy Scout and Varsity leaders must have completed New Leader Essentials, their position specific training as well as Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Venture advisors must complete New Leader Essentials, their position specific training and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Other unit, district, and council leaders must complete New Leader Essentials, plus their position specific training.


