

A Scout is Trustworthy

Do you know the story of George Washington and his father's cherry tree? It goes that six-year-old Washington damaged a cherry tree with a hatchet. When he was confronted by his father, George bravely responded, "I cannot tell a lie ... I did cut it with my hatchet."

Washington's father's anger at the injury to the tree was replaced by joy that his son was so honest. It's a tale that's been passed down for generations, but ironically was made up by a biographer who was short on information about Washington's early life, but took it as an opportunity to promote good values.

April 30 is National Honesty Day and interestingly, Washington's ethos of honesty is a part of how that date was chosen when the holiday was created in 1990. National Honesty Day was created by M. Hirsh Goldberg, the former press secretary of Maryland, who chose the date of Washington's first inauguration to celebrate. His rationale was two-fold, though, because he also felt April needed to end with a counterbalance to April Fool's Day, which Goldberg felt celebrates deception.

While not a long-standing tradition in this country, National Honesty Day is a nice reminder of something we as Scouts should do every day. It's a part of our law to be trustworthy.

Being trustworthy includes, but goes far beyond, just being honest. It means being dependable, being a person who lives up to their word and acts with integrity in everything they do. This portion of our law is why we can begin the Scout Oath with "On my honor." It's no small thing to lay on the line. Someone's honor is made up of their honesty, integrity, reputation, how they treat others and how they act when no one is looking. It's everything a person is. By giving our word at the outset of the Scout Oath, Scouts are promising to be guided by its ideals and we are measured by how well we live up to that promise.

These values are central to lessons our programs teach. Scouting builds a solid foundation of character, leadership, values and education that stays with a child for a lifetime. Independent studies have shown that our programs successfully develop character in young people, including increasing their trustworthiness. Establishing a strong foundation of values is key to preparing a young person to be a successful, responsible adult and the foundational element of ethical leadership, which we hope to inspire the next generation of leaders. I hope we all will take National Honesty Day as a reminder of the values we all share and an opportunity to reflect on the importance of trustworthiness.

Day/Twilight Camp 2019



Goose Creek Day Camp and Twilight Camp - June 17-21 at the 4H Fairgrounds in Leesburg.

Cub Scout day camps are organized by the National Capital Area Council, Boy Scouts of America and conducted by volunteers from the local area. Day camps are for registered Cub Scouts entering the 1st-5th grades the following school year. Those entering the 1st grade must be accompanied by an 'adult partner' during their participation. Twilight camps are the same as day camps but held in the evening, as such they have shorter hours and eliminate a few of the activities that occur at day camp.

Day camps are conducted by adult volunteer leadership who were trained and certified at one of the Boy Scouts of America's National Camping Schools. Day camps are also supported by a number of adult and youth staff members. Boy Scout Den Chiefs may also support the day camp program by assisting the Cub Scouts throughout the camp.

Most camps include activities based on STEM, nature, shooting sports, games, and possibly aquatics. Adult volunteers make up the nucleus of the day camp staff by volunteering in positions to lead specific programs, support the general operation, or by managing a den of Cub Scouts throughout their time at camp.

District Scout Admitted to the Second Century Society



Goose Creek Scouter J. Randall ("Randy") Minchew has been recognized by the National Capital Area Council with admission to the Second Century Society. The recognition was presented by the Council's Chief Scout Executive, Craig Poland, at the Goose Creek District Committee meeting on March 27. Randy is an Eagle Scout, Vigil Honor Order of the Arrow member, and Former Scoutmaster of Leesburg's Troop 998. As a long-time adult Scout leader, he has served the youth of Loudoun County in numerous roles through the years, including service as Goose Creek District Chairman and on the NCAC Executive Board.

The Second Century Society, SCS, is the Boy Scouts of America's national social organization of individuals, families, foundations, and corporations stewarded by key volunteers and implemented by the Boy Scouts of America National Foundation. Established in 2011, SCS, replaces the 1910 Society and Founders Circle as the way to recognize Scouting's major donors at both the local and national levels.

★ Eagle Scout Candidate and His Ashburn Troop Build and Place Mallard Duck Nesting Tubes



Stone Bridge High School sophomore and Eagle Scout candidate Tapp Rhoads is leading Scouts BSA Troop 997 in a conservation effort of consequence for the Ashburn Virginia area. Tapp and a crew of over thirty Troop 997 Scouts recently participated in a project to build and place mallard nesting tubes throughout the Ashburn Farm community.

Overseeing an Eagle Project is the normal pinnacle of a Scouts' journey to its highest rank. Adding on an attempt by Troop 997 to earn a prestigious Hornaday Unit Award only adds to the significance of the project.

Among Scouting's most coveted awards, the Hornaday medals are named to honor William T. Hornaday, noted conservationist who founded the National Zoo in Washington DC and whose wildlife efforts are widely viewed to have helped save the American Bison from extinction. Hornaday medals are given only to individuals who perform projects of major significance in the areas of conservation and environmental awareness. The equally prestigious Hornaday Unit Award can only be earned by a Scout BSA Troop when a very high proportion of the Troop's Scouts participate in an impactful environmental project of substance, that sustainably addresses an environmental or conservation issue, and that includes educational elements for both the Scouts and the public at large.

Terry Kolb, Scouts BSA Troop 997's Scout Master, and Paul Lynch, the Troop's Senior Patrol Leader, are working with Tapp to integrate the Hornaday Unit Award requirements with his Eagle project. "We are excited about helping Tapp see his Eagle project to its conclusion, and about his willingness to combine his efforts with the attempt by our Troop to earn the Hornaday Unit Award," said Scout Master Kolb. "This has been a rare undertaking, and I'm proud of the massive support we've seen by Troop 997 Scouts," added SPL Paul Lynch.

Webelos-o-ree 2019



The date for the Goose Creek's annual Webelos-o-ree is set for October 12-13, 2019 at Camp Snyder. This event is open to all Webelos so mark the date down on your calendar now. Note: Those that are currently Bears will be Webelos this fall and are eligible to attend.

This camping event is designed to show Webelos and their parents what a Scouts BSA troop is all about. If a Scout has already started working on a merit badge when a new edition of the pamphlet is introduced, they may continue to use the same pamphlet and fulfill the requirements therein to earn the badge. They need not start over again with the new pamphlet and revised requirements.

Scouts who are beginning a merit badge must use only the new requirements.

There is no time limit for starting and completing a merit badge, but all work must be completed by the time a Scout turns 18.

2019 Guide to Advancement



The *Guide to Advancement* (GTA) is updated periodically in response to changes to programs, requirements, and policies, as well as comments and recommendations received by the National Advancement Program Team. The *Guide to Advancement 2019* is now the "current edition." It can be found online at www.scouting.org/advancement in both HTML and PDF format. Printed copies will soon be available in your local Scout shop for purchase, if they are not already there, but when shopping note that the SKU is 648216, and the publication number, 33088, has not changed, so be sure to ask for the *Guide to Advancement 2019*.

The 2019 edition replaces all previous editions of the *GTA* and any other advancement manuals. It is the source for all advancement policies and procedures and, unless specifically exempted, it supersedes any BSA publications that may conflict with it. Every section of the 2019 guide has received some minor revisions since the last printed edition, primarily to reflect the addition of female youth to Cub Scouting and Scouts BSA.

In general, revisions have been made throughout this guide to make clear that all guidance and requirements of the rank advancement and awards programs apply equally to male and female Scouts. All references to the Varsity program have been removed, except when past participation in a Varsity team could be relevant, such as service in a position of responsibility. To reflect the Bylaws of the Boy Scouts of America, the objectives of Scouting, otherwise known as the aims, have been modified wherever they appear to include character development, citizenship training, leadership, and mental and physical fitness. When used throughout this guide, *Scouts BSA Handbook* refers to both the *Scouts BSA Handbook for Boys* and the *Scouts BSA Handbook for Girls*.

In this day and age of a broader international community, more frequent global travel, and multi-national job reassignments to include military and other government-related personnel movements, it is not uncommon to have Scouts from another country joining a new or transferring into a BSA unit. In the case of Scouts who have earned rank advancements in another country's Scouting program and wish to have them credited into an equivalent BSA rank, BSA has established rules and requirements to be followed, which can be found in *Guide To Advancement 2019* topic 5.0.4.0 (Youth from Other Countries).

This section provides guidance as to which youth are involved, registration procedures, and other specific details for determining the equivalency and/or applicability of requirements for determination of a BSA rank. For example, the procedures laid out in the topic apply to all ranks except Eagle Scout, which is not considered equivalent to any other Scouting association's rank.

Application is easy but can take 4-6 weeks for delivery due to the approval process.

How to visit the 2019 World Scout Jamboree: Day Passes, Dates and Details



This summer, get a taste of the worldwide fellowship of Scouting without even leaving the country.

Day passes for the 2019 World Scout Jamboree are now available, giving everyone a chance to experience this summer's global gathering of Scouts.

If your summer plans don't involve attending the World Scout Jamboree or serving on staff (known as the International Service Team), point your compass to the Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia.

Jamboree visitors can sample unique food, learn about other cultures and meet Scouts from the more than 150 countries represented. They'll also be part of a World Scouting tradition that began in 1920 with the first World Scout Jamboree.

This summer's big event is just the 24th World Scout Jamboree in history and only the second in the United States. (The other was in 1967 at Farragut State Park in Idaho.)

BSA & American Red Cross Lifeguard Training



What: BSA Lifeguard is professional level training that meets the requirements of government agencies for professional lifeguards at regulated swimming activities. The course includes American Red Cross Lifeguarding certification in addition to BSA Lifeguard certification. Those who want to work the waterfront at BSA summer camp need this training.

Who: The program is open to all registered adults and older youth (minimum age 15). Strong swimming skills are required. The course includes 7 ½ hours of online pre-work that must be completed before the first class session on May 18.

How: This course includes the Red Cross blended-learning Lifeguarding course. This requires participants to complete 7 1/2 hours of online training at their convenience before the May 18 session. The online training allows us to minimize the classroom lecture time.

When/Where: April 28; 1pm-3pm – pre requisite swim test and course orientation at local pool. May 18, 19, 25; 9am-5pm – course dates at Camp Snyder, Haymarket VA. You must attend all sessions to complete the course!

Summer Camp Season's Almost Here, So It's Time for That Annual Physical



We're mere months away from the summer, aka the Greatest Scouting Season. And while it's too early to pack your bags and load the trailer, the time is right for one essential step in summer Scouting preparation. It's time to get your physical.

As noted on the Annual Health and Medical Record website, a pre-participation physical is needed for resident campers (at summer or winter camps) and for Scouts and adult leaders attending events that last 72 hours or more.

That means it's required for every participant at summer camp, any of the four BSA high-adventure bases and the 2019 World Scout Jamboree.

What are the different parts of the Annual Health and Medical Record?

The Annual Health and Medical Record (AHMR) comes in three parts:

- Part A is an informed consent, release agreement and authorization that needs to be signed by every participant (or a parent and/or legal guardian for all youth under 18).
- Part B is general information and a health history.
- Part C is your pre-participation physical certification completed by a certified and licensed physician.

Which part of the AHMR must I (or my Scout) complete?

- For all Scouting events: Part A and B. Give the completed forms to your unit leader. This applies to all activities, day camps, local tours and weekend camping trips less than 72 hours.
- For camp: Part A, B and C. A pre-participation physical is needed for resident, tour, or trek camps or for a Scouting event of more than 72 hours, such as Wood Badge and NYLT. The exam needs to be completed by a certified and licensed physician, nurse practitioner or physician assistant. If your camp has provided you with any supplemental risk information, or if your plans include attending one of the four national high-adventure bases, share the venue's risk advisory with your medical provider when you are having your physical exam.
- For high-adventure trips: Part A, B and C. Plus, each of the four national high-adventure bases (Florida Sea Base, Northern Tier, Philmont and the Summit Bechtel Reserve) has provided a supplemental risk advisory that explains in greater detail some of the risks inherent in that program. Some Scouts arrive at a high-adventure base without discussing that base's risk factors with their health care provider, meaning they have missing info at check-in that can slow down the process.

What is meant by "annual"?

Your AHMR is valid through the end of the 12th month after the date it was administered by your medical provider.

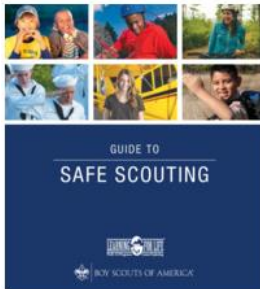
What about digitizing records?

Please don't, the BSA says. These records must be secure, and so "records are NOT to be digitized, scanned, sent by email, or stored electronically by unit leaders."

Guide to Safe Scouting Updated for 2019



Scouting safety is important enough that the guideposts we must follow are continuously reviewed and updated. The Boy Scouts of America maintains the latest version of the *Guide to Safe Scouting* online and provides a new printed version every year or so: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/toc/

This year's *Guide* includes several changes and updates. Some, as usual, are cosmetic or represent wording changes and clarifications. Others revise sections or an entire chapter.

Here's a summary:

- **Scouts BSA:** With the change in the program name from Boy Scouts to Scouts BSA, editorial changes have been made to revise the wording. Wherever there were references to *Boy Scouts* or *Boy Scouting*, they now refer to *Scouts BSA*. In other areas, references to *Scouts* have been replaced with *youth* instead. And any mention of the *Boy Scout Handbook* now lists the *Scouts BSA Handbook* instead.
- **Adult supervision:** There's no change to the requirement that a female registered leader must be present when female youth members are participating in Scouting activities, but the wording on age has been clarified to specify *21 years of age or over* rather than just over 21.
- **Tenting:** Previously, it was advised that youth sharing tents be no more than two years apart in age. Now, the word *should* has been changed to *must*, making it a requirement.
- **Webelos camping:** Wording outlining parental supervision of Webelos Scouts on overnight den campouts was removed. Existing language stipulating that Webelos Den Leaders and parents are *expected* to accompany the youth on overnight trips is still in effect.
- **Campout site approval form:** The URL for the downloadable version is included in the text along with the BSA bin number.
- **References to online resources** have changed in many instances, and the new publication reflects the current URL of those forms and documents.
- **The chapter on Animal and Insect Hazards** was rewritten in its entirety. Previously, the chapter covered four major hazards: hantavirus, rabies, Lyme disease, and mosquito-borne illnesses. The new chapter has more general advice on being aware of all such hazards (not just those listed specifically), being prepared to encounter them, and a list of resources found online from the US Centers for Disease Control on mosquito, tick, wildlife, rodent, and rabies hazards. These are likely more comprehensive and current than what could be published in the *Guide*.
- **Incident reporting:** There is now a URL for the online incident reporting form, and it's listed in the *Guide*.
- **Event safety checklist:** The multi-page, multi-purpose checklist has been entirely revised. The new form has check boxes for the various areas and items, and is organized in a more logical manner to help facilitate event planning. Many new areas of concern have been added.

Every Scouter is expected to be familiar with what's in the *Guide to Safe Scouting* as a way of keeping youth safe while in our care. Bookmark or download the latest version, or purchase a copy at your Scout Shop, and keep it nearby any time you're with our youth.



Clearing Up Common Questions About What We Wear



Scouting founder Robert Baden-Powell was a stickler for correct uniforming. In *Aids to Scoutmastership*, he explained why: “Smartness in uniform and correctness in detail may seem a small matter, but has its value in the development of self-respect and means an immense deal to the reputation of the movement among outsiders who judge by what they see.”

These days, many packs, troops and crews have a more relaxed stance on uniforms. No Scout is turned away or publicly admonished because he or she isn’t wearing the right thing. But in an effort to keep the uniform, well, uniform, we present these common conundrums.

What’s the field uniform?

It’s what most people think of as the Scout uniform. It includes the uniform shirt; switchback pants, shorts, girls’ skort or girls’ roll-up pants; belt; socks; and, depending on your program, cap and neckerchief. (For Lions, the official uniform is a T-shirt and optional cap.)

What’s the activity uniform?

It’s appropriate for informal occasions. It’s the same as the field uniform, with a Scouting T-shirt or polo shirt replacing the uniform shirt and neckerchief. (Sometimes you’ll hear this unofficially called “Class B” and the field uniform called “Class A.”)

Can neckerchiefs be worn with the activity uniform?

Yes — and also with nonuniform clothing. That change was made to bring the BSA in line with other Scout associations around the world.

What are the pant options for girl Cub Scouts?

Tigers, Wolves, Bears and Webelos who wear the blue Cub Scout uniform can choose from switchback pants, shorts, roll-up pants and skorts. Webelos who wear the khaki uniform can choose from pants and shorts. (Additional uniform options for girls in the khaki uniform are expected to be available in 2019.)

How can girls with ponytails wear Cub Scout caps?

All current Cub Scout rank caps, with the exception of Webelos, are adjustable to allow for a ponytail. The Supply Group is planning to release similar caps for Webelos soon.

The Learn Center: Home of Improved Online Training for Cub Scout Volunteers



Wow! Go to My.Scouting.Org and click on the Learn Center. You'll see an updated catalog of, simplified, succinct, topic-specific training modules for Cub Scout volunteers. In all, there are approximately 20 modules, and more may be added later.

Volunteers can now complete their training at a time and location (at home!) that is most convenient for them. The courses themselves are separated into tracks: one for den leaders and assistants; one for Cubmasters; and one for pack committee members. The modules are of varying lengths, some taking only a few minutes to complete. They can be taken individually, or, time permitting, one right after another. They can be accessed via computer or mobile device, including a smartphone. Completion of the required modules in each track will be recorded in the training record of each volunteer within the Learn Center. Completion of the track will qualify the volunteer to wear the "Trained" patch for their volunteer position.

Here is an example scenario: A new den leader or assistant who wants to know what to do before that allimportant first meeting can click on Before the First Meeting. There they will see several training modules that will be helpful, including How to Conduct a Cub Scout Den Meeting. Subsequent modules pertain to den management, how to involve adults to assist in Cub Scouting, childhood development, Cub Scout pack finances, keeping Cub Scouting safe, how to conduct a Cub Scout pack meeting, and many more.

Wood Badge



Wood Badge is advanced Scout leader training that began in 1919 by Lord Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting and Wood Badge's first director. It came to America in 1948 and has been updated to reflect current BSA policies and programs. Incorporating the best techniques available, Wood Badge has become the most advanced leadership training course in Scouting!

Wood Badge is the highest level of Scout leadership training and provides you with the tools to be a superior leader. The leadership skills taught are for leaders from all Scouting areas including Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Venturing and the district and council. The 1st half of the course utilizes a classroom environment and practical exercises to teach the essentials of leadership. You'll learn what makes leadership work for you in Scouting and your personal life. The 2nd half offers classroom and outdoor experiences to help you learn the application of leadership skills. Finally, you will write and complete a "Ticket". The "Ticket" consists of five written goals. These goals connect your new leadership knowledge to your role in Scouting.

Any Scouter who has attended basic training for their registered position and serves in a leadership role in Scouting or in a position that directly supports a unit can attend.

This spring's course will be held on May 3 – 5 & May 31 – June 2 at Camp Snyder. Both sessions must be attended.

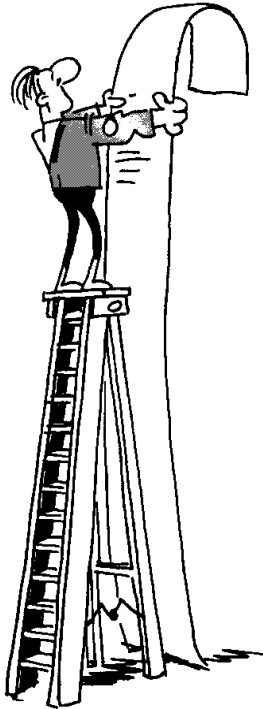
