This weekend at the Trainers EDGE training we got into a discussion about "letting Scouts fail to learn". About half of the room agreed with the idea and the other half agreed that the Scout needs to learn, but using the term 'fail' did not sit well with them.

I think its semantics but the goal is to get the Scout to learn. In Scouting we call it Guided Discovery. Allowing the Scout to learn by making mistakes, problem solving, and executing solutions to the situation. The adult leader is there to maintain safety, offer advice, and keep the Scout heading in the right direction. The leader does that in a subtle way, not doing the task, making the decision, or being up front. The leader is there to keep the Scout 'in bounds' so to speak. The Scout knows he has a safety net.

So how does this "Guided Discovery" concept work or get put into action. It is not about letting a Scout hang in the wind. It is not about allowing failure to occur just for the sake of letting a Scout fail. No, Guided Discovery happens when we ask questions. This implies that the leader is engaged fully in this process. Now that does not require the leader to hover and maintain an arms reach distance. It simply forces the issue through leading questions to assist in the Scout finding the answer.

Problem solving and role-playing can play a big part in guided discovery. Many times I ask a simple question, what do you think? Not, what do you think is right. Rather, what are you thinking? Most of the time this question provokes enough thought and produces a clearer picture of the desired outcome. Problem solving and role-playing can spark thought and allow the Scout(s) to see possible outcomes both good and bad and allow the decision-making process to happen. This is not lofty and can happen at every level.

Using the Start, Stop, and Continue assessment tool in the middle of a task is also a great way to discover solutions and assist in decision-making. The leader can act as a referee in some cases and step in with a well-placed question that may get the group thinking about alternative solutions.

The goal is to allow the Scout to make decisions and learn. Through Guided Discovery, we teach, coach, train and mentor the Scout to better understanding of skills, leadership, and self-reliance.

Goose Creek Day/Twilight Camp - 2020



As you know, this is turning out to be quite a hum-dinger of a year. In true Scouting tradition, we can't disappoint when it comes to camp, either. Here are the latest developments:

At this time, Day Camp and Twilight Camp are still a go. However, leadership has come to terms with the fact that June 15 is simply too soon a date to gather hundreds of youth and adults together for an entire week given the current state of affairs! It just wouldn't be safe. Therefore, we have worked with the fairgrounds, our beloved favorite stomping grounds, and we have decided that we will attempt to hold our camps on the days of August 10-14 for Day Camp, and August 10-13 for Twilight Camp. There will also be a "Set Up and Orientation Day" the weekend before (specifics are tbd).

Of course, cancellation still can't be ruled out. A cancellation is a Council decision, out of our hands to decide here in the District, and it will of course depend on the situation that develops over the summer. We will be sure to pass the information on to you as it comes in.

Here are just a few details for now:

- Council has decided not to extend the Early Bird Pricing past April 30, so on May 1, the price will change to \$210 for Day Camp, and \$130 for Twilight. If you are on the fence, register ASAP!
- It's a safe registration. This means that if Council decides that cancellation will
 be the safest move, your fee will be 100% refunded. Also, if you have already
 registered, and our new start date will not work for your camper, let us
 (GooseCreekCubCamp@gmail.com) know and we will work with Council on
 a refund. They have told us they will be glad to work with families on that.
- Many options were discussed at a planning meeting that was held this evening. There is the possibility that we could end up with a limited camp size; masks may be required (and we know what a struggle first graders have with those! That was heavily emphasized in the conversation); and you can rest assured there will be hand sanitizer everywhere. It will all be based on the situation as we move closer to August. Whatever the final decision for our beloved camp and its layout, Council has the safety of our campers and our families at the forefront of every decision that is made.

We hope everyone is safe and healthy, and we hope to get back to enjoying the things we love, like camp, very soon!



Council-Wide Virtual Campout



This Memorial Day weekend (May 23-24), the NCAC Camping Centennial Committee is holding a Council-Wide Virtual Campout and they need your help. We know that lots of Goose Creek units have been very successful moving their programs to a virtual base, and here is an opportunity to show off our scouting skills while still doing our part to protect our communities with social distancing.

The Camping Centennial Committee would like help from the Districts to identify and recommend youth-lead content for youth - Cubs, Scouts BSA and Venturing/High Adventure.- for the event. There will be self-guided activities, prerecorded activities to view at the scout and scouters leisure and live content via Zoom/Webinar. We are working on security measures to ensure the live events are not disrupted by bad behavior! We know there are scouts of all ages who enjoy sharing their knowledge with others. Now is their opportunity to do so for a large audience - up to 300 scouts per Zoom call.

Webelos-o-ree 2019



The date for the Goose Creek's annual Webelos-o-ree is set for October 3-4, 2020 at Camp Snyder. This event is open to all Webelos so mark the date down on your calendar now. Note: Those that are currently Bears will be Webelos this fall and are eligible to attend.

This camping event is designed to show Webelos and their parents what a Scouts BSA troop is all about. The activities will be run by our own troops and can include such things as: Fire building, cooking, monkey bridge, BB shooting and/or archery, first aid, and knife safety. We provide dinner and in the evening there is a campfire run by the Order of the Arrow. For the adults we'll provide plenty of Scout leaders to answer questions about camping, joining a troop, and camping equipment. We will also hold a Webelos to Scout orientation for Arrow of Light Scouts.

The Webelos-o-ree starts off with an opening ceremony Saturday morning and wraps up Sunday after chapel services. For those who don't want to camp over, there are also registration options for staying just for the activity periods and for joining us for dinner and the campfire before going home.

Troop Participation in the Webelos-o-ree



At the Webelos-o-ree each troop selects an activity/skill that their Scouts teach the Webelos and their parents during a morning and afternoon session. And the cost? Nothing! There is no registration fee for Boy Scouts, even if they camp. The only thing required is a service project to help keep the event running (starting cooking fires, cleanup, food prep, etc.).

If your troop is interested in participating in this year's Webelos-o-ree, even if you were at last year's, please contact *Webelosoree@GooseCreekDistrict.org* so we can coordinate the activities to be run. We have space for seven troops to camp over and, as always, there is no fee for troops to attend. They just have to supply their own food.

For the past few years we have tried to keep certain activities reserved for the troops that have done them in the past, this has often had us scrambling to fill them in when we finally heard that a troop doing one could not come that year. This year all activity slots are open and will be given to the first troop that requests them.

The Summit Award represents Venturing's highest honor and is as hard to earn as an Eagle badge. To achieve this ultimate recognition, a Venturer earns the Pathfinder award, earns seven Tier II or Tier III adventures, serves the crew as a leader— both formally and informally— and mentors another Venturer. In addition, the Venturer designs and leads a service project to benefit others. At the end the Venturer goes through a District led Board of Review.

How to Conduct a Board of Review through Videoconferencing



The board of review, like most aspects of Scouting, works best in person.

But sometimes, for a number of legitimate reasons, that's not an option. That's why, as outlined in the *Guide to Advancement* (section 8.0.1.6), the BSA allows units to conduct boards of review by teleconferencing, using tools like Skype, Google Hangouts or Zoom.

Even before the coronavirus prompted families to be justifiably concerned about face-to-face meetings, this option has existed. In the past, it has been most commonly used in two situations:

- young people who have gone off to college or the military
- young people who live in remote areas

But the uncertainty and anxiety surrounding the coronavirus makes this an appropriate time to turn to videoconferencing solutions, as well.

If an Eagle Scout board of review must be convened using videoconferencing, make a request to the NCAC ARC (*alandeter@verizon.net*), and indicate the following:

- Scout's Name, BSA ID, Date of Birth
- Troop, District
- Reason for Request including the urgency that argues against holding an in-person Board of Review when conditions will allow in-person meetings in the near future

Advancement during COVID-19: Guidelines for Cub Scouts



For Cub Scouts, the BSA will allow parents and other adults in the Cub Scout's family to sign off on Webelos and Arrow of Light requirements through July 31, 2020. Normally, only a den leader may sign off on these requirements.

Also, Cub Scouts can continue to work on their current den's advancement through July 31, 2020. This gives extra time for Cub Scouts to complete their badge of rank; if they earn their badge of rank prior to July 31, 2020, they may advance to the next rank.



Temporary Changes Made to Rank Advancement/Camping Requirements



Scouts BSA has implemented temporary changes, detailed below, to allow Scouts to complete rank requirements by through September 1, 2020. This deadline will be reevaluated as needed.

The goal when using video conferencing must be to preserve the ideals and intent of each requirement as best as possible. Scoutmasters or their designee(s) should remain mindful of the Methods of Scouting, such as the Patrol Method, before implementing the modified requirements listed below. Some advancement activities can be completed by video conferencing but not all. For example, virtual visits to a city council meeting, national historic landmarks, museums, and art galleries may be acceptable, but swimming, rifle shooting, and motorboating merit badges cannot be completed virtually.

Even when using video conferencing, all virtual campouts and activities should consist of as many elements found on a normal outdoor campout or activity as possible. All existing youth protection policies and digital safety guidelines must be followed.

Tenderfoot rank requirements

- 1b. Virtual patrol or troop campouts via video conferencing will be permitted.
- 2a. During the same day as your virtual patrol or troop campout, assist in preparing one meal with the help of those with whom you live. Tell your patrol or troop why it was important for each person to share in meal preparation and cleanup.
- 2b. During the same day as your virtual campout, demonstrate the appropriate method of safely cleaning items used to prepare, serve and eat a meal.
- 5a. Explain the importance of the buddy system as it relates to your personal safety on outings and in your neighborhood. Verbally commit to following the buddy system on your next troop or patrol outing.
- 7a. Tell how to display, raise, lower, and fold the U.S. flag.

Second Class rank requirements:

- 1a & 1c. Virtual patrol or troop activities via video conferencing will be permitted.
- 3b. Using a compass and map together, plan a 5-mile hike approved by your adult leader.
- 4. Evidence of wild animals can be demonstrated with information or photos of your local area found online.
- 5c. May be completed virtually via video conferencing on dry land.
- 7c. Learn about the dangers of using drugs, alcohol and tobacco and other practices that could be harmful to your health. Discuss what you learned with your family and explain the dangers of substance addictions. Report to your Scoutmaster or other adult leader in your troop about which parts of the Scout Oath and Scout Law relate to what you learned.
- 8a. May be completed virtually using video conferencing.
- 8d. May be completed by comparing costs at three (3) online sites or locations.

First Class rank requirements:

- 1a Virtual patrol or troop activities via video conferencing will be permitted.
- 2e. On the same day as your virtual campout, serve as the cook. Supervise your assistant(s) in using a stove or building a cooking fire. Prepare the breakfast, lunch, and dinner planned in First Class requirement 2a. Supervise the cleanup.
- 4a. By drawing, computer software, or other virtual methods, plan an orienteering course that would cover at least one mile. Explain why measuring the height and/or width of designated items (tree, tower, canyon, ditch, etc.) is helpful. Explain how you would complete your course using a real map and compass.
- 4b. Scouts do not need to follow their route.
- 5a. Evidence of native plants can be demonstrated with information or photos of your local area found online.
- 6e. May be completed on dry land.
- 9a. Visit may take place virtually or by phone.
- 9c. Outings can include past or future plans.

Advancement during COVID-19: Time extensions for Eagle Scout, Summit and Quartermaster awards



Normally granted only in rare circumstances, the BSA and its local councils will allow extensions for Life Scouts needing more time to finish their Eagle Scout requirements. The authority for councils to grant this extension is effective immediately and continues through Sept. 30, 2020.

Extensions also are available for Venturers needing to finish Summit Award requirements and Sea Scouts needing to finish Quartermaster Award requirements beyond their 21st birthday.

These extensions are reviewed case by case, and not all Scouts will qualify. To get an extension through a local council, Scouts must meet the following requirements:

- It can be established that COVID-19 disruptions were the only circumstances that delayed work on Eagle Scout/Summit/Quartermaster advancement requirements, such as the service project or merit badges. If any other causes were involved, the extension request must go to the National Council following the process outlined in the Guide to Advancement (GTA).
- 2. Extensions shall only be granted to youth in Scouts BSA who have **already achieved Life rank.**
- Request for Extension Content (with an email sent to NCAC ARC Appeals and Extensions Coordinator (Brad Scales, msva_tenor@yahoo.com), and cc'ing your district Advancement Chair (Alan.Steiner@GooseCreekDistrict.org) and the NCAC Adv Chair (AlanDeter@verizon.net), containing: ...
 - Scout's Registered Name, E-Mail, Contact Number, BSA ID, DoB
 - Troop, District
 - Life Scout Board of Review Date
 - Description of Eagle Project
 - Reason for Delay
 - Adult's Name, E-Mail, Contact Number
- 4. When the council receives a COVID-19-related request for a time extension, the council reviews the request and approves it if appropriate. A written response stating the outcome of the extension request must go to the youth. If approved, the notification must be attached to the youth's Eagle/Summit/Quartermaster rank application.
- 5. For Eagle, the extension must not exceed 3 months from the youth's 18th birthday; for Summit/Quartermaster, the extension must not exceed 3 months from the youth's 21st.
- 6. Upon turning 18, the Scout must submit a completed adult application and successfully complete Youth Protection training. Their participant code will now be UP for SBSA or VP for Venturing and Sea Scouting.
- 7. Extension requests for more than 3 months beyond the youth's 18th/21st birthday must be sent to the National Service Center following the process outlined in the GTA.

Life-to-Eagle Training



Keep your eyes open for an email announcement of our remaining 2020 offerings of the Life-to-Eagle (L2E) Training for Goose Creek.

These training conferences are primarily targeted for the Life-to-Eagle Advisers & Coordinators at the unit level – but are by no means limited to same. Life Scouts and their parents are strongly encouraged to attend as well. The key goal is to get each of the unit Eagle Advisers up to speed on changes to the process, and some of the district-level mechanics of same. That way, they can help share the message to the Life Scouts in their units on a more frequent basis.

The next L2E Seminar for 2020 was supposed to be in May. However, due to current events, the only option for conducting such would be virtual, and frankly, no one wants to sit in on a 4-hour virtual training. Holding hope that things will have relaxed in August our next L2E Seminar is tentatively scheduled for

The package should include four documents – an Adult Volunteer application, the associated background check waiver, a copy of your YPT certification, and a Merit Badge Counselor application. Please be patient - I'm working on updating the list (see below) and we'll send out a notice when the revised version is posted. I know that MBC volunteers are very important in the current environment – please email me with questions or if you need help in any way. The most common issue I've heard is that the list is incomplete. There are some main reasons why this might be the case, some of which I can fix and some are in your court.

We continue to make progress updating and rebuilding the MBC list. By the time you read this, an April month-end update of the list should be posted to the Goose Creek District website: www.ncacbsa.org/goose-creek/advancements-and-recognition/

Several hundred new entries have been added since last month, and a number of existing MBCs have agreed to expand their coverage by agreeing to work with any District Scout.

We have worked through most of the application backlog, so let us know if MBCs from your Troop(s) are missing, and we'll try to figure out how to get that fixed.

And a broad reminder – 2018 was a renewal year for YPT – everyone had to retake it. That means that in 2020, almost everyone is due to refresh. Please try to stay on top of that process – we can't include MBCs on the list who have expired YPT certification.



Important Reminders for New MBC's



The number of video merit badge classes continues to soar, providing great opportunities for our Scouts to continue Scouting. But just as reminders, while group discussions are not only appropriate but encouraged in the learning process, an MBC must confirm that each Scout has successfully and *individually* completed each requirement. As well, please remember that MBCs must ensure that each Scout completes all requirements <u>as written</u> – MBCs to not have the authority to change requirements at any time (only the BSA Advancement folks have that authority). If you haven't had a chance, there's a great training series for Merit Badge Counselors at <u>www.my.scouting.org</u> that goes over all the do's and don'ts of being an MBC:

Digital Safety and Online Scouting Activities



As Scouting moves to virtual and online platforms, we offer the following reminders to help keep kids safe. The below guidance applies to all online Scouting activities and meetings. Note: Some states may have legal requirements that differ from, and even go beyond, what is provided here. It is your responsibility to check and abide by your state laws and consult your local council when reviewing and applying the following guidance, which is not comprehensive.

- Follow all youth protection policies.
 - All youth protection policies still apply in an online environment. Ensure you always have two-deep leadership for online activities and meetings. Our ban on one-on-one contact between an adult leader and youth applies to all interactions -- whether in person, online, through a web conference, over the phone, via text, or in any other form.
 - All aspects of the Scouting program are open to observation by parents, and the BSA suggests parents take part in online activities and meetings.
- Use business-oriented conference platforms that include good safety and privacy features instead of platforms with other primary purposes (such as gaming).
 - Review the terms of service, safety and privacy features, and data collection policies of any platform you use, and review the BSA Digital Privacy and Social Media Guidelines.
- Regularly review and implement the latest security features of your chosen platform to avoid unauthorized visitors or other security issues in your meetings.
 - Just as you put in place plans for the physical security of your meeting place, here are some tips to consider as you get started developing your own strategy to manage online security:
 - Use unique meeting identification numbers for each session.
 - Utilize password features for all meetings.
 - Do not publish meeting invitations via public forums and remind attendees not to pass along invitations.
 - Use "waiting room" features to manage letting individuals into your meetings.
 - Disable features that you will not need, such as screen-sharing by non-hosts, private chats, and whiteboards.
- Do not record online activities/meetings that include youth participants.
- Recording of online activities that only involve adults is subject to local council legal review and approval. Check with your local council for guidance.
 - Call recording is subject to various legal requirements under U.S. law and the laws
 of individual states, some of which require all parties to a call consent to recording.
- · Safeguard personal information.
 - o If you collect a person's personal information online—for example, through web forms used to register people for online meetings—then you should post a notice or disclosure at the point of collection describing how you will use the information. The notice should be conspicuous and written in plain English.
 - Meeting organizers must keep such information private and not share a youth's personal information with anyone except that youth's parent or guardian or the unit leader responsible for tracking advancements.
- Collecting personal information from youth under 13 is not recommended.
 - Do not collect personal information directly from youth under 13 years of age due to the parental notice and consent requirements under the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act ("COPPA"). You should collect any data needed from the parent or legal guardian only.



Can Packs, Troops or Crews Participate in Political Rallies?



The BSA might be the most patriotic organization in the U.S. But we don't endorse any one political party. You could say that rather than being pro-left or pro-right, the BSA is pro-America.

The same applies to your pack, troop, post, ship or crew. You and your Scouts should Do Your Duty to Country but not by endorsing any one candidate.

During election years, the line between patriotism and political favoritism becomes thin, making it important to remind you of the BSA's official policy on Scout participation in political rallies.

Here are some Frequently Asked Questions and the BSA's official answers:

Q: Could a pack, troop or crew provide a color guard flag ceremony for a candidate's public speaking event or rally?

A: Yes. But, BSA Policy requires our adult and youth members in uniform to leave immediately after the presentation of colors and the Pledge of Allegiance. Should they want to stay they must do so as individuals, not Scouting representatives. That means they would have to change out of their uniforms.

Q: So Scouts and Scouters can't stand on the platform for the remainder of the speech or presentation?

A: No, they should not remain on the speakers' platform or in a conspicuous location where media could construe their presence as an endorsement or symbol of support.

Q: Why is this the rule?

A: The policy is meant to prevent someone from using our brand to convey support of a candidate or ideology. This prevents Scouts from being used by any party in campaign advertisements or materials.

Q: So then why is it OK to even present the colors or lead the Pledge of Allegiance at all?

A: Those are displays of loyalty to the nation, something the BSA has always endorsed. Regardless of the outcome of the political race, the candidate and supporters pledge allegiance to the U.S. Because of this, it is always acceptable and deemed to be a part of the civic process. Also, this "service" is offered to any party, regardless of political affiliation.

Q: Can Scouts and Scouters pose for photos with political candidates at these events?

A: Yes. But photos of candidates or Scouts in uniform or BSA marks and logos are not allowed in political campaign materials of any kind.

Over the course of 10 days, Jamboree participants will experience unforgettable adventures they'll remember all their lives. They can experience the Summit's legendary adventure sports programs, earn merit badges, enjoy stadium shows and trade patches with Scouts from all 50 states and many foreign countries.

In doing all that, Jamboree participants join a tradition that has been a part of the BSA since the very first National Jamboree in 1937.

Participant requirements

- Have a current BSA membership.
- Be at least 12 by the first day of the Jamboree (July 21, 2021) but not yet 18 by the last day of the Jamboree (July 30, 2021). If your Scout will be too old to be a youth participant, they should consider applying for an adult leader role or Jamboree Service Team (staff) position.
- Be approved by the unit leader and local council.
- Have an appropriate parent/guardian to complete the online parental consent. (An email will be sent to the parent/guardian during the application process.)
- Participate in pre-Jamboree training experience with their local council and unit leader.
- Submit their BSA Annual Health & Medical Record using the online Jamboree submission process. (The AHMR must be dated on or after July 1, 2020.)
- Submit all registration fees per the local council's payment schedule.

This course has an overnight camping requirement.


