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
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

Deserved vs. Earned

One of the greatest pleasures, and privileges, that I've had for the last few years has been to be a District Representative at Eagle Boards of Review. Listening to these young men and women explain how they planned and executed their Eagle projects, their experiences in Scouting, and what they plan to do in the future, makes me believe more and more in the Scouting Program. And hearing the other board members tell how they watched these young people grow up in the unit, not just physically but in maturity and confidence, emphasizes that even more. I'd advise any parent, especially new ones to a unit, to sit in on one to see what our program is not only trying to accomplish, but able to accomplish as well.

During these reviews many questions are asked and some lead on to further philosophical discussions about Scouting and life in general. One of these, from a recent board has stuck in my mind. Near the end I asked the Scout, "Why should we make you an Eagle Scout?" To which the Scout replied, "Because I deserve it." My response, "I don't think deserve is correct, but you have definitely earned it; and you did that by fulfilling the requirements – nothing more, nothing less" So why did I make that distinction, and what is the difference between the words *deserve* and *earn*?

If you sort through various literature, you will find the two words used in an almost interchangeable manner. We exchange these two words so often that some consider them synonyms, and some thesauruses and dictionaries even list them as such. I wouldn't go so far to say that they are incorrect, but in a purely Scouting sense, I consider these words so far apart as to be antonyms.

Some people define deserve as something for which they are entitled, as if by birthright. We think we deserve to have something, as a result of a natural course of events. If another has something, we should have it too. *Deserve* is also a term used by those who feel they are owed something by being a good person, a human, or a human being that is alive.

Earn has a more meritorious quality, a justifiable reward for the hard work put into attaining a goal.

Making Eagle is hard work. It requires years for a Scout to not only advance in all the ranks, but to acquire the necessary merit badges, to do the leadership positions, and plan and lead their Eagle project. Nobody gets Eagle because they deserve it, they put in the work and earn it.

Thomas Paine said: "What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly: it is dearness only that gives everything its value." Making Eagle is not easy, and I'd like to think that it is held dearly in value by all those who obtain it for the rest of their lives.

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Registration opens for the 2022 National Order of the Arrow Conference



Thousands of Arrowmen from around the country will meet at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, next year for the *2022 National Order of the Arrow Conference*. If you want to be one of those attendees, now is the time to sign up.

Registration opened this week for the flagship national Order of the Arrow event, which returns after the 2020 event was cancelled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. A virtual event called Momentum Launch was held instead.

Typically, the event draws about 8,000 Order of the Arrow members from every state. The conference features arena shows, national awards, competitions, training classes and a conference festival. Plus, there'll be time for everyone's favorite pastime: patch trading.

Since 1948, the modern NOAC has been held roughly every two years at a major university campus. The University of Tennessee, Knoxville, has hosted the conference in 1977, 1992 and 2000. Being at a university gives youth an opportunity to experience a college campus in a safe Scouting environment. Delegates will stay in the dorms for the week and will eat in the dining halls. You can attend NOAC via a number of different options: as a delegate, individual, staff member or virtual delegate.

Most attendees sign up as delegates. These Arrowmen register and attend with their local Order of the Arrow lodge. In 2018, the virtual delegate option was introduced; this option will be expanded for 2022. New for 2022 will be the individual option for attendees who are 21 years old or older who do not wish to attend with their local lodge.

NOAC fees are based on which option you sign up for. Conference fees cover housing, programming and food. Staff and individual attendees are responsible for coordinating their own transportation while delegates' transportation fees are at the discretion of their lodge contingent leadership.

Any registered member of the Boy Scouts of America and the Order of the Arrow as of the conference start date can attend with the review and approval of your council Scout executive or their designee. All attendees will need to provide BSA Annual Health and Medical Record forms A, B and C. Adults also are required to have up-to-date BSA Youth Protection certification.

Delegates will register directly with their lodge leadership. All other attendees can register individually at *registration.oa-bsa.org*. For answers to FAQ, check out *oa-bsa.org/program/events/noac*.

Training Required for ALL New Merit Badge Counselor Applications



All new applications for Merit Badge Counselor must include documentation that the applicant has completed Merit Badge Counselor training. This can be accomplished in-person or online. If you've taken an in-person course, please email a copy of the completion certificate when sending in your MBC Information Form. If taking online, please take a screenshot of the notice of completion after you finish the courses, and email a copy of that screenshot.

The estimated time to complete the required courses is about 35 minutes, and many of you may have already taken at least some of the online courses in training for other positions. The courses that make up the MBC training module are all available via the BSA Learning Center on my.scouting.org:

SCO-471 - Advancement

SCO-472 - Aims and methods of Scouts BSA

SCO-474 - Introduction to Merit Badges

SCO-486 - What is a Merit Badge Counselor?

The only alteration to our MBC onboarding process is the inclusion of the above documentation. The online application process remains, as does the submission of that MBC Information Form that lists badges, contact info, etc.

While not yet required, existing Merit Badge Counselors are strongly encouraged to do the online training sessions, if only to familiarize yourselves with any changes over the years.

Cub Scout Bobcat Requirements: Balloon Bust Game



Don't you just love those cute little Tigers? They are adorable! But then you try to teach them the Cub Scout Bobcat requirements. Between the Scouts asking when they're going home and if they're getting a snack, it's hard to keep their attention!

We do have to remember they're first graders, so it's up to us to find fun ways for them to learn the important Bobcat requirements such as the Scout Oath and the Scout Law.

One suggestion is this Bobcat Balloon Bust game.

Prior to the meeting, write each of the Bobcat requirements on slips of paper. Insert one requirement into each balloon and blow them up.

If you have a large den, you may want to divide the Scouts into smaller groups for this activity so that they won't have to wait very long for their turn to pop a balloon. Remember, they are little guys, so patience isn't always a strength of theirs!

A word of caution. Let your parents know ahead of time that this will be the activity. Some of the little guys might be afraid of balloons or of the loud noise they'll make when they're popped. Also, you may have a Scout in your den who has a latex allergy.

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Your Scout Can Help Shape the Future of Scouts BSA Within New Youth Council



Scouting teaches youth to be leaders, and that means learning to speak up and voice opinions. These skills are used immediately in guiding one's patrol or troop. But for one group of Scouts, those skills will soon help in guiding the direction of the national Scouts BSA program.

The national Scouts BSA committee is seeking nominations of Scouts who'd like to share their perspectives on the program's strengths and areas for growth. These Scouts will meet virtually once a month on Zoom to discuss the program's future and provide feedback to the committee.

The 10-15 selected Scouts can expect a three-hour commitment each month, from January to May 2022. This includes work before, during and after the virtual meetings, which will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. ET on the second Sunday of every month. Scouts on this inaugural council are expected to attend at least four of the five meetings. There's no cost to be part of the youth council, but Scouts must be nominated by a Scouting volunteer or professional.

Eligibility requirements

The nomination deadline for this council is Nov. 5. Complete this form to nominate a Scout; you can nominate more than one Scout.

For a Scout to be nominated, he or she must be:

- A current member of the Scouts BSA program.
- First Class rank or higher.
- At least 14 years old (but not yet 18) during the entire council term (January 1, 2022, to May 31, 2022).
- In a position of responsibility in a Scouts BSA troop, either current or recent.

In case you missed the livestreamed announcement or the multitude of promotional announcements and e-mails, the next National Scout Jamboree will be held July 19-28, 2023 at the Summit in West Virginia.

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Eagle Scouts, Be Prepared to apply for NESA scholarships soon



Earning the Eagle Scout rank is an impressive achievement that provides lasting impacts on one's life. One of those impacts can be financial support for higher education.

Beginning December 1, the *National Eagle Scout Association* will be accepting applications for five annual scholarships of varying amounts. Applicants must have completed an Eagle Scout board of review before January 24, 2022; must be members of NESA (*click here* to join); and must submit their application through the *NESA scholarship portal* between December 1, 2021, and January 31, 2022. Full requirements and conditions are listed *here*.

Other eligibility requirements include:

- Eagle Scouts may apply for NESA scholarships beginning in their senior year of high school through their junior year in college.
- Recipients may receive a NESA scholarship one time only.
- NESA scholarships are available to Eagle Scouts attending four-year colleges or universities, vocational trade schools and other approved programs.
- NESA scholarships are not available to students attending any of the U.S. military academies.
- NESA scholarships are not available to graduate students pursuing a master's or doctoral degree.

Last year, 45 Eagle Scouts received a total of \$425,500 from NESA to aid in their educational endeavors. These scholarships are made possible by generous donors and NESA members that help the alumni organization.

American Legion Eagle Scout of the Year



How much: \$10,000 for the winner and \$2,500 apiece for three runners-up

Who's eligible: Eagle Scouts who are at least 15 and registered, active members of a Boy Scout Troop, Varsity Scout Team, or Venturing Crew chartered to an American Legion post, American Legion Auxiliary unit or Sons of The American Legion squadron — or Eagle Scouts who are registered, active members of a chartered Boy Scout Troop, Varsity Scout Team, or Venturing Crew, and the son or grandson of a Legionnaire, Sons of The American Legion or Auxiliary member,

Nomination Window: Nov 1 - March 1

What's required: Application, photograph, school participation record, Scouting record, community service record, religious award record and four letters of recommendation.

Scout Ranger Program Might Be the National Park Service's Best-Kept Secret



From Acadia in Maine to Joshua Tree in California and beyond, our country's national parks hosted 237 million people in 2020.

But despite the continued popularity of these wide-open spaces, there's one National Park Service offering that remains lesser known. It's the *Resource Stewardship Scout Ranger* program.

The Resource Stewardship Scout Ranger program invites Boy and Cub Scouts to participate in educational and/or volunteer service projects at national park sites to spark their awareness of the national parks and to provide Scouts with the opportunity to explore the national parks and learn more about protecting our natural and cultural resources. Scouts are awarded certificates and/or patches for participating in the program.

How to Earn a Certificate and/or Patch

Scouts can participate in the Resource Stewardship Scout Ranger Program through a troop, event, travel, or camp experience, and will be awarded a program certificate and/or patch upon completion.

To earn a Scout Ranger certificate, Scouts should participate in organized education activities and/or volunteer service projects for a minimum of five (5) hours at one or more national parks.

To earn a Scout Ranger patch, Scouts should participate in organized educational activities or volunteer service projects for a minimum of ten (10) hours at one or more national parks.

Get-Started Guide for New Scouting Leaders



The people at *Scouting* magazine have been where you are, and they understand just how intimidating the job can be. So they created a handy guide to help you through the first months of your Scouting career. Half of the tips in it stem from their own experience; the other half come from Scouters across the country who responded to survey questions on their Facebook page.















What is BALOO, And Why Is It Good for You?



A few years ago, longtime Cub Scout training experts Matt Markham and Jessi King-Markham found that volunteers who willingly attended Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation to learn to take their Cub Scouts camping often balked at signing up for a second and separate training, what was then called Outdoor Leader Skills for Webelos Leaders (often referred to as "OWLS").

"One of the challenges we ran into with splitting the course out into OWLS was that people wouldn't go, because it was another course that they had to take," Markham says.

There seemed to be a lot of overlap in content, too, so the couple's district in the Northern Star Council ran a hybrid course that covered both syllabuses. The overnight event allowed leaders to get hands-on training in outdoor skills for Cub Scouts and Webelos Scouts.

That hybrid is still the official approach. The *BALOO* syllabus covers what Cub and Webelos Scout leaders need to know. And it does so in a single 30-hour weekend — all day Saturday and Sunday morning, for example.

What the weekend covers

Cub Scouting has changed significantly in the past few years, most notably with the introduction of a new advancement program in 2015. That meant significant changes to the syllabuses, especially on the Webelos side. OWLS was built around the old advancement program.

What's more, Markham says, is that Cub Scout camping has evolved with the advent of activities like geocaching.

"There's a whole lot of people that want to do it that have no idea how, and there wasn't really a way to teach them," he says. "Now there's actually a course that captures some of those outdoor activities and methods."

Those activities and methods help explain why the course is longer.

"We had a lot more skills to fit into the program, so we needed to take more time," says Dennis Kampa, who starting overseeing BALOO as a member of the National Cub Scout Committee back in 2000.

Online and in the field

The weekend experience is just part of BALOO. The course begins with eight brief online modules, available at my.scouting.org. Each module lasts 10 minutes or less, and covers basics like the benefits of the outdoor program and health and safety considerations. Once you've completed those prerequisites, you're ready for the weekend.

Of course, knowledge is only part of BALOO's goal, King-Markham says.

"If we can get Cub Scouts camping, they're going to be lifelong Scouts," she says. "They're going to be people who want to save the outdoors. They're going to be people who bring their own families into the outdoors."

Wood Badge



Wood Badge is the Boy Scouts of America's ultimate leadership training designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of Scouters in all aspects of the BSA, whether unit, district, or council level – from assistant den leaders to Scoutmasters, from Cubmasters to Venturing Advisors, from committee members to commissioners. It is a fun, energetic, and inspiring course guaranteed to infuse your unit with fun and meaning – all designed to fulfill the mission of the BSA, and ensure our youth is getting everything they are promised from the program.

Reflecting the best of nearly a century of Scouting experience, Wood Badge draws upon the most current leadership models used by corporate America, academic circles, and successful organizations throughout the country. Participants can expect to develop skills in many areas, including leadership theory, team building, problem-solving, communication, project planning and more. Wood Badge consists of two parts:

- The first five full days is the initial group training, usually held over two weekends – the first weekend Friday through Sunday, and the second Saturday and Sunday.
- The second part requires participants to apply the skills they learned by completing a 5-part plan (called a "ticket") over the following 18 months, leading towards the individual participant's vision of a better Scouting future.

Requirements for attending Wood Badge:

- 1. Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.
- 2. Have completed the basic position-specific training courses for their Scouting role.
- 3. Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical. Part C is required for everyone, including people who are not present for more than 72 hours.

A minimum (non-refundable) deposit is due with registration, and then full payment is due 45 days before the start of the course. Each Wood Badge course is limited to 48 participants. Per national guidelines, any course not having 30 fully paid participants 30 days prior to the start of the course is subject to cancellation.

Registration Now Open for National Wood Badge Course at The Summit



At first, it sounds like a reality TV pitch: What happens when you bring together 64 strangers from across the country and challenge them to spend five days living, learning and working together?

But the reality behind the National Wood Badge Course, planned for January 2022 at the Summit Bechtel Reserve, is better than anything seen on TV.

This reality has the potential to change your life forever.

That's not slick marketing copy. That's the message we're hearing from participants and staffers who attended this course the last time it was held, in 2020. Kaleen Deatherage of Portland, Ore., was there as a troop guide for the Antelope Patrol.

"The energy and enthusiasm from participants and staff alike resulted in powerful sharing, learning and collaboration that will make each one of us better Scouters," she says. "My hope is that we all brought that energy and some new skills home — and now we are better prepared to deliver Scouting programs to our youth."

That course in 2020 was so popular that it required a wait list, but there's no waiting necessary if you're ready to accept the challenge of Wood Badge early next year.

Registration is now open for the next National Model Linked Troop Wood Badge Course, set for Jan. 17–21, 2022, at the Summit in West Virginia. It's a chance to learn the latest leadership techniques, form connections with fellow Scouters from other parts of the country, and enjoy hands-on experiences sure to make you a better Scout leader, spouse, boss, employee, parent and person.

The course is open to any registered member of the BSA age 18 or older who has completed the basic training courses for their Scouting position.

Participants and staff not only benefit from meeting people from across the country and around the world, but those in the female troop will be inspired from seeing so many female leaders in one room.

The course uses the new Wood Badge syllabus first introduced in 2017 and piloted in 2018. All courses held in 2020 and beyond use the new syllabus. The course is also a model course because it uses the "linked troop" model introduced as an option for Scouts BSA units.

The course is actually two courses run concurrently, with a combination of separate and joint learning sessions of all-female and all-male troops. Each troop will have six patrols and no more than 32 members.


