Little to Big

Do a Good Turn Daily. That is the Slogan of Scouting. It is a challenge to each of us to look for some way to be of service. The slogan asks us to seek opportunities every day to do something ... anything that will ultimately make a difference.

It is my belief that when we look at this challenge we feel it is too large. It is a lofty goal to actually make a difference in this world.

What we need to do is think little. Little things matter.

When we teach leadership in our Troop one of our principles is to “Focus on the Little Things.” That principle is all about details and those things that add up to big things. Little things like keeping your gloves out of the snow. Just a little thing, but the big thing is cold hands, wet gear, and maybe frost bite. Another example is ensuring that your tent is pitched properly. Making sure your guy lines are taught and pulled in line. Not a big deal, until it rains and your rain fly does not function properly. Just a little thing that makes a big difference.

And so it is with the Good Turn. Little things make a big difference. Holding open a door or carrying a bag. Little things that make a big difference for the person you helped.

A smile could change someone’s attitude or outlook on the day.

I think we get wrapped up in service for service sake and not for the difference we make.

Just think.. there are about two million Scouts in America. They represent about 103 thousand units. Those units represent Schools, Churches, Communities. So if 2 million Scouts did their Good Turn each day, just something small, we could change our world. That does not even take into consideration the Adult Volunteers that teach, coach, train, and mentor those 2 million Scouts. Add about 1.2 million to that number. 3 million people doing a small act of service every day. When we talk about little to big we can see that we make a big difference when and where it really matters.

In 2015 the Boy Scouts of America logged 1.53 million service hours. Those were hours of service dedicated to building things, collecting food, and working for our communities. That seems like a big number but at the end of the day we may not see the big impact. A lot of our service is dedicated to our chartering partners and people directly impacted in Scouting. That is great and I certainly would not want to take one minute of those hours away... they make a difference. But in snap shots.

Little to Big ... each of us ... every day. Now that would leave a mark that could be seen from outer space.

Think little to big. Do your Good Turn every day!

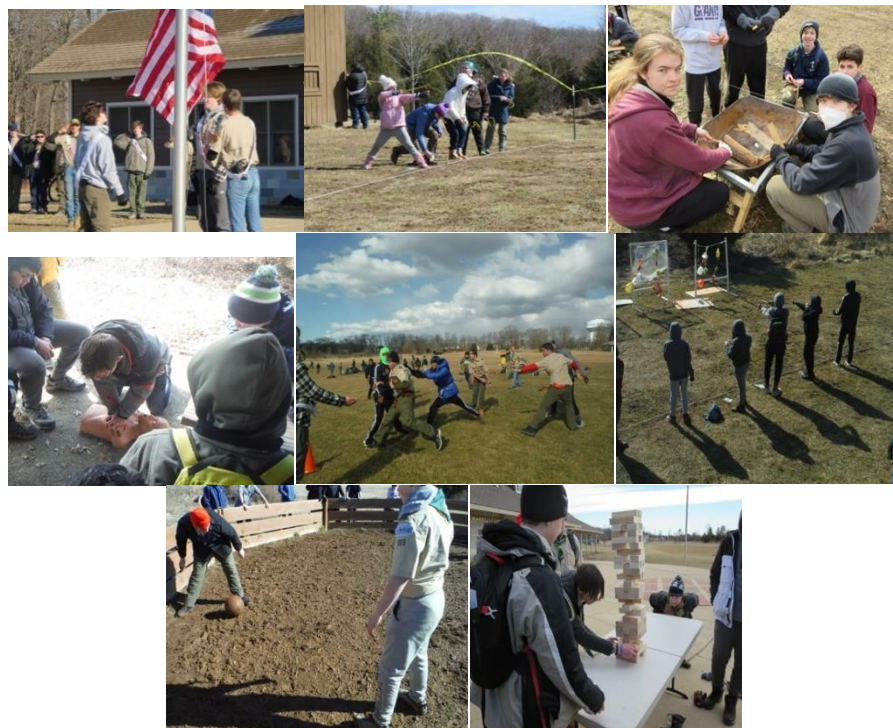


Goose Creek District Freeze-O-Ree Recap

Next in-person class: March 5-6, 2022, ***USA ARCHERY LEVEL 1 & 2 INSTRUCTOR TRAINING***, WALKERSVILLE WATERSHED, FREDERICK, MD. Be sure to notify USArchery that certification is for Boy Scouts

Rifle/Shotgun

Completion of NRA Rifle and/or Shotgun Instructor Course and Certification is required to supervise Scouts BSA Shooting events. This certification is good for 2 years and renewable through [NRA Instructors website](https://www.nrainstructors.org).

Tomahawk

Tomahawk-throwing must be supervised by an experienced Scouter when being thrown at Unit or District events. If interested in serving, send your name, years of experience and unit # to: John Witek, GCD Shooting Sports Chair, john.witek@goosecreekdistrict.org to be processed through NCAC Shooting Sports Committee.

If you are interested in applying for a Shooting Sports event in GCD, be sure to visit our Basecamp District Committee Team, select 'Shooting Sports' in 'Docs and Files' and download and fill out the Shooting Sports Event Request.

If you are interested in hosting a Shooting Sports event on a non-BSA property, be sure to visit the same area in Basecamp and download and review "Private Property Approval for Shooting Sports by Units, Districts, and Councils" and "NCAC So You Want to Hold a Shooting Activity" document to properly set up your range.

Contact John Witek, Chief Range Safety Officer, john.witek@goosecreekdistrict.org, to review and approve your shooting range. Without approval, BSA will not insure your activity.



Eagle Cam



In September 2021, Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy, the American Eagle Foundation and HDOntap partnered with the Dulles Greenway to install two live-stream cameras at the Bald Eagle nest in the Dulles Greenway Wetlands in Leesburg, Virginia.

The nest cameras provide live-streamed, high-definition insight into the movements of the eagles. It is an incredible opportunity to raise awareness in the community about the importance of the protection of Bald Eagles living in the heart of Loudoun County. Ongoing updates on the eagles will be posted during the nesting season.

A mated pair of Bald Eagles have resided in the Dulles Greenway Wetlands for more than 15 years. In 1995, during the construction of the Dulles Greenway roadway, TRIP II established a private 149-acre wetlands preserve in Leesburg, Virginia to mitigate the loss of roughly 64 acres of federally protected wetlands. Wetlands shelter more than one-third of threatened and endangered species in the United States, including the once-endangered Bald Eagles. Since 1995, the wetlands property has been managed by Loudoun Wildlife and used for local wildlife education.

End of Temporary COVID Advancement Requirement Changes



The BSA just announced that on March 1st this year all temporary changes made to Scouts BSA advancement requirements to address the COVID-19 pandemic will expire, and the standard rules for Scouts BSA advancement will return on the March 1st date.

This will include the temporary deferment of some swimming requirements for Second Class and First Class, the virtual activities temporarily substituted for Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class ranks, and requirement 9b for the Camping merit badge; in all of these instances the regular requirements will return on March 1st, 2022. The GUIDE TO ADVANCEMENT, Section 10.2.2.0, states: "(Youth) members must meet current advancement requirements as written for merit badges, all ranks, and Eagle Palms—no more and no less—and they are to do exactly what is stated."

Citizenship in Society, the BSA's Newest Merit Badge



The first group of merit badge counselors for this new badge have been trained and approved by the NCAC Merit Badge Dean. Remember, while Citizenship in Society will be Eagle-required after June 30, 2022, it's available today for any Scout to pursue.

Goose Creek currently has four approved counselors - contact info was posted on the password-protected MBC list maintained on the Goose Creek website in early February (<https://www.ncacbsa.org/goose-creek/district-resources/>).

The NCAC Advancement & Recognition Committee has established specific guidelines for Merit Badge Counselors for this badge. Please contact Rich Pender, Goose Creek District Merit Badge Dean at meritbadgedean@goosecreekdistrict.org if you'd like the details. If you are interested in applying, one of the requirements is to take a live (zoom) course on the specifics of the merit badge that's been developed by the first wave of MBCs. These courses will be scheduled periodically, but there's one currently in the planning stages at the Council level, so if you're interested, please advise Rich Pender.

Fourteen Steps to Build a Campfire



1. Split dead limb into fragments and one fragment into slivers.
2. Bandage left thumb.
3. Chop other fragments into smaller fragments.
4. Bandage left foot.
5. Make structure of slivers (including those imbedded in your hand).
6. Light match.
7. Light match.
8. Repeat "a Scout is Cheerful" and light another match.
9. Apply match to slivers, add wood fragments, and blow gently into base of flame.
10. Apply burn ointment to nose.

New Process for ESRA Verifications and Submittals

We have a new process for Eagle Scout Rank Applications (ESRAs) approvals that is going into IMMEDIATE EFFECT. The reason for this is at the end of this message.

ESRA Verification for Approval to hold an Eagle Scout Board of Review (EBoR)

1. Whereas before the District Eagle Representatives (DER) would review the ESRA and initial it before you sent it in to Council, now they will be the ones signing the ESRA for the Council.
2. If they find no problems with the ESRA the unit can then set up the EBoR.
3. No notification to Council needs to be done. Council will not be responding to any ESRA verification requests.

Note: If you already have a Council approved ESRA you are still good to go and don't need the DER to sign it.

After the EBoR:

1. All ESRAs are to be emailed in to council at 082NCAC_EagleCert@scouting.org. No exceptions.
2. Only the ESRA is required. The Statement of Life Ambitions, project workbook, blue cards, etc are not to be sent in. Note: Approved Time Extensions should still be included.
3. Council will no longer be accepting hardcopy dropoffs at the office.

Why, why, why:

With the change from ScoutNet to Akela for Council use, the BSA broke a number of tools on ScoutNet and has been unable to rebuild them on Akela; one of those tools was ESRA Verification. Which means that all ESRAs now have to be manually reviewed, and with over 1,300 ESRAs going in to Council annually, and only one person there to verify them, it has become impossible to do in any timely manner. So the districts will now be taking up the slack to verify the ESRAs. There is no short-term fix for Akela so this will be our new process for quite some time.

BSA recently posted the February 2022 version of the ESRA on <https://www.scouting.org/advancement>. There were only two changes - under Age Requirement Eligibility, the board of review information was updated to 24 months which reflects the Guide to Advancement 2021 change and the 3rd page was removed regarding NESA's request for supplemental information. Scout's DO NOT need to reaccomplish the ESRA as a result of these changes. The NCAC Eagle Scout Information page link connects you to the new version.

Try a Slackline!



A slackline is a two-inch webbing strap stretched tightly between two trees. You start at one end and try to walk to the other. Beginners can rely on spotters,

Slacklines are easy to set up, easy to understand, but challenging to walk. They develop balance, core strength, focus, coordination, and teamwork. A slackline is fun for all ages at meetings, campouts, and any event large or small. Verhead training lines, or both for stability and encouragement.

The NCAC Climbing Committee rents slacklines to Bouldering Facilitators for \$15/weekend. Bouldering Facilitator training takes a couple of hours and can be arranged on request. Contact NCAC.Climbing@gmail.com for details..

So what's bouldering?

Bouldering is climbing close to the ground, usually on a big rock or a wall with artificial climbing holds. In BSA bouldering activities, a climber's feet are never more than the climber's shoulder height from the ground. The climber moves sideways (traverses) more than upward and is always protected by at least two spotters.

Bouldering requires no special equipment and is appropriate for Scouts and Scouters of all ages. Many climbers practice bouldering to develop skill, agility, power and endurance. Some enjoy the simplicity and challenge so much that it is their only climbing activity. Bouldering allows climbers to push themselves beyond what might be appropriate on a higher climb.

BSA bouldering activities must be supervised by at least one certified Bouldering Facilitator, Climbing Instructor-in-Training, Climbing Level I or Level II Instructor, Climbing Director, COPE Instructor-in-Training, COPE Level I or Level II Instructor, or COPE Director. The maximum participant-to-supervisor ratio is 12:1.

A Bouldering Facilitator must be a registered Scout or Scouter 16 years or older and must be re-evaluated yearly to maintain certification.

Scouts Trash the Trash Day



Scouts Trash the Trash Day is an international Messengers of Peace project for Scouts around the world, where each Scout is challenged to bring a friend or family member along and pick up at least one Kilo (2.2 pounds) of trash each on the first Saturday in May.

The idea for Scouts Trash the Trash Day came from the scouts of Troop 1206 in Helena, Montana after realizing that there are several days throughout the year that Scouts get together and do the same thing on the same day. Days like Jamboree on the Air and Internet, Jamboree on the Trail, Trees for the World, World Neckerchief Day, but there was not a day for Scouts to all get together and clean up their communities. Thus Scouts Trash the Trash Day was started. Scouts are asked to bring a non-scout with them on this day of service in order to double the impact of their trash cleaning effort.



Scouts Trash the Trash Day is about more than just cleaning our planet, it is a day to show the world what Scouting is about, educate individuals about Scouting and recruit new boys, girls and adults into the Scouting movement..

All registered Cubs, Tigers – Webelos and their adult leaders/parents sleep on cots in 4-person BSA wall tents that sit on raised platforms, eat in the camp dining hall and experience a whole day into the night program. The program at camp includes opportunities for Scouts to earn Adventure Loops, and several just-for-fun activities. The importance of Cub Resident camp to a registered Cub Scout and their family is tremendous! Resident Camp will develop your Scout's or dens' self-reliance and resourcefulness by providing learning experiences in which campers acquire knowledge, skills, and attitudes essential to their well-being.

Training Opportunities

Wood Badge



Wood Badge is the Boy Scouts of America's ultimate leadership training designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of Scouters in all aspects of the BSA, whether unit, district, or council level – from assistant den leaders to Scoutmasters, from Cubmasters to Venturing Advisors, from committee members to commissioners. It is a fun, energetic, and inspiring course guaranteed to infuse your unit with fun and meaning – all designed to fulfill the mission of the BSA, and ensure our youth is getting everything they are promised from the program.

Reflecting the best of nearly a century of Scouting experience, Wood Badge draws upon the most current leadership models used by corporate America, academic circles, and successful organizations throughout the country. Participants can expect to develop skills in many areas, including leadership theory, team building, problem-solving, communication, project planning and more. These skills can be taken back to packs, troops, crews, and ships to help leaders guide youth in dynamic Scouting programs. Scouters will find these skills invaluable in their business and personal lives as well.

Wood Badge consists of two parts:

- The first five full days is the initial group training, usually held over two weekends – the first weekend Friday through Sunday, and the second Saturday and Sunday.
- The second part requires participants to apply the skills they learned by completing a 5-part plan (called a “ticket”) over the following 18 months, leading towards the individual participant's vision of a better Scouting future.

Requirements for attending Wood Badge:

1. Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.
2. Have completed the basic position-specific training courses for their Scouting role.
3. Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical. Part C is required for everyone, including people who are not present for more than 72 hours.

A minimum (non-refundable) deposit is due with registration, and then full payment is due 45 days before the start of the course. Each Wood Badge course is limited to 48 participants. Per national guidelines, any course not having 30 fully paid participants 30 days prior to the start of the course is subject to cancellation.

Are you interested in adding a camping component to your Pack activities? BALOO training is a one-and-a-half day introduction to the Cub Scout outdoor program. You will complete the online prerequisite component, and then an overnight practical camp to use your new skills. We'll review BSA's Cub Scout level camping policies, and provide the necessary tools to help your unit carry out a successful camping experience.

BALOO participants must complete the online prerequisites course before attending the overnight practical.

It is mandatory for a MINIMUM OF ONE adult on a Pack overnighter to have taken this course. Best practice has a minimum of three on any Cub campout.

Bonus: You are welcome to attend one of the IOLS prerequisite classes. If you elect to do so - You will be given credit for both BALOO and IOLS, with no extra cost.

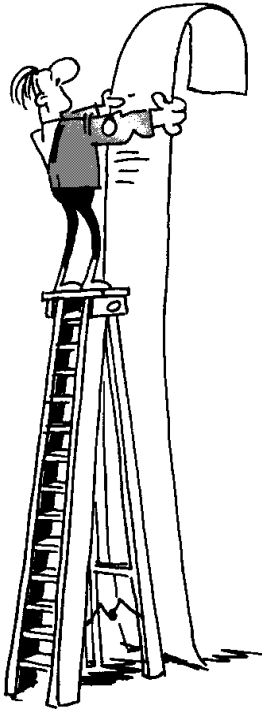
