### District Eagle Representative (DER) Duties

- POC for Eagle Scout advancement questions.
- Review, counsel, and approve FSSP.
- Review ESRA and coordinate submission to NCAC for pre-BoR verification.
- Notify Troop of NCAC verification.
- Participate on ESBOR.



#### **Important Project Info**

- Project must be the Scouts work
- Project Proposal must be approved <u>before</u> the project is started by:
  - The Troop (Unit Leader <u>and</u> Committee Chair)
  - Beneficiary
  - District Eagle representative
- Project Coach?

NCAC Eagle Scout Procedures Guide

It takes time to get a project approved



#### District Eagle Representative will look for

For the proposal to be approved, it must show the following:

- 1. The project provides sufficient opportunity to meet the Eagle Scout Service Project requirement. The [Scout] must show that planning, development, and leadership will take place; and how the three factors will benefit a religious institution, a school, or your community.
- 2. **It project appears to be feasible.** The [Scout] must show the project is realistic for you to complete.
- 3. **Safety issues** <u>will</u> be addressed. The [Scout] must show you have an understanding of what must be done to guard against injury, and what will be done if someone does get hurt.
- 4. **Action steps for further detailed planning are included.** The [Scout] must make a list of the key steps you will take to make sure your plan has enough details to be carried out successfully.
- 5. The [Scout] is on the right track with a reasonable chance for a positive experience.



#### **Fundraising**

- NOT the project / how the Scout will show leadership
- Preference is for the beneficiary to pay the full cost of the project
  - If the Beneficiary conducts a fundraising event to pay for the project,
     the Scout does not have to submit a fundraising application
- A fundraising application is not required if funds are provided by:
  - The Troop
  - The Charter Organization
  - The Scout's immediate family
  - Families of Scouts in the Troop
- Fundraising application is required if raising more than \$500 and it must be approved by council PRIOR to the fundraising event.



#### **Lessons Learned**

- Read the Guide to Safe Scouting
- Call "Miss Utility" <u>BEFORE</u> you dig
- Consider using pop-up canopy's to protect volunteers from the sun / rain
- Water available for volunteers
- Have a written safety brief with cue cards
- Map out / label the work area
- Caution tape
- Available bathrooms
- Call ahead to de-conflict schedules
- Conduct a meeting with helpers <u>BEFORE</u> the work day
- Pay the electric bill
- Have a communications plan <u>and a</u> contingency plan
- Consider the time of year / weather
- Expect the unexpected.. be flexible

Communications

- Earn a total of 21 merit badges (10 more than required for the Life rank).
- Some merit badges have mandatory time requirements:
  - <u>Camping</u> 20 days and nights of camping.
  - <u>Family Life</u> 90 days doing household chores.
  - Personal Fitness 12 weeks of an exercise program, plus a physical and a dental visit.
  - Personal Management 13 week budget.
  - Don't wait until age 17 years-9 months to start.
- Only one MB may be used where alternatives are available. Any additional alternative required MB counted as an optional MB.
- Candidates for Star & Life, in the selection of "any four" or "any three" respectively, of the MB required for Eagle, amy choose from all listed, including where alternatives are available. (Guide to Advancement 7.0.4.5).
- When completing the ESRA, the scout must choose which merit badges will count as "required" and which as "optional".
- On the ESRA the elective merit badges should be listed in chronological order. (NCAC Eagle Scout Procedures Guide)



- Completion dates matter
  - Verify that the information on the "Blue Card" matches:
    - ESRA
    - Internet Advancement
    - A current Internet Advancement Summary report
       MUST BE submitted with the ESRA

A common summer camp MB gotchya...

Completion of the First Aid MB **IS** one of the Wilderness Survival MB requirements, **not** a prerequisite. The First Aid MB **MUST BE** completed **BEFORE** completion of the Wilderness Survival MB.



#### Requirement #3 - Merit Badges

REQUIREMENT 3. Earn a total of 21 merit badges (required badges are listed). List the month, day, and year the merit badge was earned.

<sup>\*</sup>Cross out badges not earned. If a crossed-out badge was earned, it may be reentered in 14 through 21.

The Blue Card is <u>THE OFFICIAL</u> record. Be sure that the dates in Internet Advancement match the dates on the Blue Cards. If not, the ESRA will be returned to the Troop.



- While a Life Scout, serve actively in your unit for a period of <u>six months</u> in one or more of the following positions of responsibility (Eagle Scout Rank Application 2016 Printing):
  - Boy Scout troop. Patrol leader, assistant senior patrol leader, senior patrol leader, troop guide, Order of the Arrow troop representative, den chief, scribe, librarian, historian, quartermaster, junior assistant Scoutmaster, chaplain aide, instructor, webmaster, or outdoor ethics guide.
  - Lone Scout. Leadership responsibility in your school, religious organization, club, or elsewhere in your community.
  - Varsity Scout team Captain, co-captain, program manager, squad leader, team secretary, Order of the Arrow team representative, librarian, historian, quartermaster, chaplain aide, instructor, den chief, webmaster, or outdoor ethics guide.
  - Venturing crew/Sea Scout ship President, vice president, secretary, treasurer, quartermaster, historian, den chief, guide, boatswain, boatswain's mate, yeoman, purser, storekeeper, or webmaster.



- The time for this requirement does not have to be continuous, nor does it even have to be with the same Troop!
  - Example 1: Scout serves 2 months after making Life, then takes 6 months off to participate in a sport
  - Example 2: Scout moves to a new town and takes time to find a new troop
- Time may not be done concurrently
  - You may not hold 2 positions at the same time for 3 months and call it good.



#### Order of the Arrow Representative

 OA Rep requires a letter from the WSD OA Chapter Advisor (Mr. Rob Little) documenting the Scouts Leadership participation.

#### Outdoor Ethics Guide – Leave No Trace Training

- Leave No Trace Trainer / Outdoor Ethics Guide requires completion of BSA approved LNT Training.
  - BSA Leave No Trace 101. The course is designed to help youth and adults at all
    program levels understand the general principles of Leave No Trace and how to
    apply them in the general BSA outdoor program
  - **BSA Leave No Trace Trainer Course.** This <u>16-hour, overnight course</u> trains interested individuals <u>ages 14 and older</u> to serve as Leave No Trace Trainers.
  - Completion of this course or another recognized Leave No Trace Trainer course is required for a youth to hold the Boy Scout/Varsity Scout Outdoor Ethics Guide position of responsibility in his unit.
- Outdoor Ethics guide may only be used as a position of responsibility beginning 1 Jan 2016. Before 1 Jan 2016 use Leave No Trace Trainer.



• While a Life Scout, plan, develop, and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to any religious institution, any school, or your community. (The project must benefit an organization other than the Boy Scouts of America.) A project proposal must be approved by the organization benefiting from the effort, your Scoutmaster and unit committee, and the council or district before you start. You must use the Eagle Scout Service Project Workbook, BSA publication No. 512-927, in meeting this requirement. (To learn more about the Eagle Scout service project, see the Guide to Advancement, topics 9.0.2.0 through 9.0.2.16.)

Scouts **MUST** use the current workbook when planning began. Workbook is available at Scouting.org.



#### **ESRA Lessons Learned**

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#### **Life Purpose Statement**

- Submitted with the ESRA.
- A "Statement of your ambitions and life purpose".
  - List of positions held in in which the scout demonstrated leadership.
    - Religious institution
    - School
    - Camp
    - Community
    - Or other organizations
  - Include honors and awards received during this service.



# Pre-Board of Review Records Verification By Council

- The Scout submits completed ESRA, ESSP workbook, Scout Handbook and original Blue Cards to the Unit (maybe Eagle Mentor, Scoutmaster, Advancement Chair or Unit Committee Chair).
- Troop reviews all material and submits the signed ESRA (Scout, Unit Leader, Unit Committee Chair), Statement of Ambitions and Internet Advancement Summary report, District Eagle Representative (DER).
   DER may requests additional information. (NCAC Eagle Scout Procedures Guide)
- DER reviews the ESRA and additional documents, confirms information and ensures that the ESRA has been properly completed.
- DER or unit submits the ESRA to NCAC for pre-BOR verification.
- If DER receives NCAC verification and ESBOR authorization, DER will forward to the unit.
- ESBOR must be completed within 3 months of the Scout's 18<sup>th</sup> Birthday without approval from NCAC.
