Why Have Range & Target Sports in Scouts BSA?

- Popular program that promotes recruitment and retention
- Opportunity to teach Safety at young age

SAFETY ALWAYS COMES FIRST!

- Advance Approval by Council is Required for All District and Troop Range & Target Sports Events
 - Approval delegated to NCAC Shooting Sports Committee
 - Requires minimum of 90 days lead time
- NCAC Unit/District Event Review Form Available on NCAC Shooting Sports Page



NCAC Shooting Sports Unit/District Event Review (v11d)

All requests to allow or support a shooting sport (archery, rifle, pistol, shotgun, slingshot, BB) at any event held in NCAC (Council, District, Unit) must be submitted in a timely manner using the form below. The event is not authorized for shooting sports unless event approval is received from the NCAC Shooting Sports Committee. Send the completed form to the Committee Chairman Demi Pulas (K4BSA@verizon.net) and Vice-Chair for Administration Brian Suddeth (Brian@Suddeth.com) for review to ensure appropriate standards for qualified supervision, approved range, and appropriate equipment are covered and the activity is logged for NCAC records.

Please follow these guidelines for submission:

















Air Rifle/BB Rifle

- Air rifles must shoot at 540 feet per second (FPS) or less, .177 caliber pellets
- Eye Protection Required

Rifle

- .22 caliber rimfire bolt action (.22 Short, Long, LR)

With/without box magazine
No semi-autos, pump/lever action,
high-capacity or tube magazines.

- Prone or supported bench positions recommended
- Eye and Ear Protection Required



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Shotgun

- 12 Gauge or smaller
- Ammo: Shot size 7.5, 8, 9 (typical skeet/trap shot sizes)
- Can be any action type, semi-auto recommended
- Straightaway trap recommended
- Eye and Ear Protection Required

Muzzleloading Rifle/Shotgun

- Must be of modern manufacture
- Kit guns must be inspected by a gunsmith
- Percussion cap (sidelock or inline)











Archery

- Proper sized equipment (15lb+) pull weight
- Recurve or Compound Bows
- Arrows in good condition with target points
 - No broadheads/field points
- Arm-guard, thumb tabs, ground quiver, etc.
- Appropriate target butts and target faces (round or box targets)
 - No animal targets











Slingshots/Wrist rockets

- Ammo must not be hard (no stones, etc.)
- Biodegradable preferred: suggest dog kibbles
- Targets can be hanging "reactive" targets
- Eye protection required



Tomahawk/Knife Throwing

- French or Blackhawk— full size or junior OK
- Fixed-blade knives designed for throwing not Scout pocket knives or hunting knives





Prohibited Activities Include but are Not Limited to

- Flintlock rifles and shotguns
- Centerfire rifles (except at Philmont, Summit, etc.)
- Reloaded ammunition (except Philmont)
- Crossbows
- Bottle rockets or fireworks
- Exploding targets of any kind
- NFA Firearms/devices (e.g., machine guns, SBRs)





5 Levels of Scouts BSA Range & Target Sports

- In general, the five levels are:
 - 1. A first-time introductory shooting experience
 - 2. Open shooting experience (most common unit level)
 - 3. Ongoing shooting experience (e.g., MB program)
 - 4. Competitive shooting
 - 5. Becoming an Instructor
- Levels define what is needed in terms of participant/staff training and what equipment is allowed





Qualified Supervision is Required!













Qualified Supervision is Required!

Rifle/Air Rifle/Muzzleloading

- Current NRA Certified Rifle Instructor or BSA Shooting Sports
 Director AND NRA Certified Range Safety Officer (2 people)
- Ratio: Air/Rimfire: 1 Instructor AND 1 RSO to 8 Scouts
- Muzzleloading: NRA/NMLR ML Instructor 1:1 Ratio AND 1:8 RSO

Shotgun

- Current NRA Certified Shotgun Instructor or BSA Shooting Sports Director AND NRA Certified Range Safety Officer
- Ratio: 1 to 1 Instructor to Scout that is currently shooting AND 1 to 6 RSO





Qualified Supervision is Required!

Archery

- Current USA Archery Level 1 (or higher)
 Instructor (Must be 18+) or BSA Shooting
 Sports Director
- Ratio 1 to 8

Tomahawk/Knife Throwing

- Responsible adult (18+) familiar with the use of tomahawk/knife throwing and appropriate adults
- Ratio: 1 to 4

Slingshots/Wrist Rockets

- Current BB Gun Rangemaster
- Ratio: 1 to 4

OR


 Merit Badge Program or NRA First Steps or Basic Training for firearm type (Shotgun or Rifle)









Merit Badge Program



All range operations for merit badge instruction must be under control of a currently NRA certified Instructor (or USA Archery Instructor) and a currently certified NRA Range Safety Officer.



WARNING: some merit badge counselors are not properly certified to manage the range and shooting required for the merit badge

Where Can Scouts Shoot?

Firearms

- National & Council Camps
- Public/private Gun Club or Range
- Pre-approved Private land. Must be inspected by NCAC-approved CRSO prior to use in ready-to-use condition

Archery/ Tomahawk/Knife Throwing /Slingshots

- Anywhere that is safe, legal and can be setup per BSA guidelines
